The Basics of Scuba Diving

Scuba diving, an acronym for Self-Contained Underwater Breathing Apparatus, allows divers to breathe underwater using a tank of compressed air. The essential equipment includes a mask, fins, regulator, buoyancy control device (BCD), and wetsuit or drysuit depending on the water temperature. A fundamental part of scuba diving is proper training and certification, typically obtained through recognized organizations such as PADI (Professional Association of Diving Instructors) or NAUI (National Association of Underwater Instructors). These courses cover vital skills, safety procedures, and environmental conservation practices.

Dear Editor

Over this past long weekend the Federal Liberals, in conjunction with the Mayor of Brampton, made, yet, another announcement on "car thefts" and amending the Criminal Code. Some may be of the thought that this will deter "car theft," violent crime," "home invasions," etc. What we all need to understand is that the laws are already there and this is merely an attempt to play with Canadian's fears to garner votes. To be clear this has nothing to do with the enforcement community, it is to show that there is already "Theft" included in section 322, of the Criminal Code; those involved in the crime of "theft" using any form of telecommunications during that theft, there is section 326 "Theft of telecommunication service;" section 334 - "Punishment for theft"; and section 333.1 - "Motor vehicle theft."

"Motor vehicle theft

333.1 (1) Everyone who commits theft is, if the property stolen is a motor vehicle, guilty of an offence and liable

(a) on proceedings by way of indictment, to imprisonment for a term of not more than 10 years, and to a minimum punishment of imprisonment for a term of six months in the case of a third or subsequent offence under this subsection; or

(b) on summary conviction, to imprisonment for a term of not more than two years less a day.

Subsequent offences

(2) For the purpose of determining whether a convicted person has committed a third or subsequent offence, an offence for which the person was previously convicted is considered to be an earlier

offence whether it was prosecuted by indictment or by way of summary conviction proceedings. 2010, c. 14, s. 3; 2019, c. 25, s. 121."

The sad part is, this was implemented in 2019 and yet you can still steal 3 vehicles and only serve 6 months each, or 1¹/₂ years for all 3. Where's the deterrent?

And when it comes to the youth, that are performing these car thefts, if they are members of gangs and/or are being coerced into lives of crime, there is section 423 – "Intimidation."

Canadians don't need more sections in the Criminal Code, other pieces of legislation or more photo-ops. What we do need is real jobs for people so they won't

be driven to theft just to survive or quick money.

Our economy isn't working, because government keeps over-taxing, so they can spend, spend, spend, with no end in sight. The spending of government, isn't doing anything for Canadians or jobs. That said, the debt this government is creating isn't doing anything for any of our kids (19-24), either, especially those involved in car theft, other than driving the "car theft" underground economy.

No more platitudes and no more increases in taxes. We need politicians who will look at this through the eyes of someone who has actually read the Criminal Code to see everything is already there – USE IT! By Elizabeth Marshall

Township of Springwater Officially Opens Homer Barrett Park





Notice of Passing of By-law Extending Interim Control By-law 23-044

Date: April 25, 2024

TAKE NOTICE that the Council for the Corporation of the Township of Tiny passed By-law 24-027 on the 8th day of April, 2024 pursuant to Section 38(2) of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, c.P.13 as amended.

This By-law applies to all properties within the Limited Service Residential (LSR), Shoreline Residential (SR), Greenlands (GL) and Open Space One (OS1) Zones in the Township of Tiny and within 30 metres of the Georgian Bay 178-metre contour.

PURPOSE AND EFFECT OF THE BY-LAW

THE PURPOSE of the By-law is to amend Interim Control By-law 23-044, as amended, to extend the period of time during which it will be in effect. Section 5 of By-law 23-044, as amended, is further amended to specify that By-law 23-044 shall remain in effect for a period of two (2) years from the date of its enactment. By-law 23-044 was passed May 29, 2023 to provide the Township with the opportunity to undertake a study to review its land use planning policies pertaining to retaining walls, fences, landscaping and structures in proximity to the 178 metre contour elevation of the Georgian Bay Shoreline; and to ensure that any retaining walls, fences, landscaping and structures are appropriately sited and regulated once the study has been completed.

THE EFFECT of By-law 24-027 is that By-law 23-044, as amended, is in effect until May 29, 2025 in order to allow for the completion of the associated study.

Only individuals, corporations and public bodies may appeal the extension of an interim control bylaw to the Ontario Land Tribunal (OLT). A notice of appeal may not be filed by an unincorporated association or group. However, a notice of appeal may be filed in the name of an individual who is a member of the association or the group on its behalf.

A notice of appeal setting out the reasons for the appeal, accompanied by payment by certified cheque or money order, made payable to the Ontario Minister of Finance, must be filed with the Clerk of the Township of Tiny by no later than May 28, 2024.

Water Treatment and Servicing Master Plan Municipal Class Environmental Assessment – Notice of Public Information Centre No. 2

TAKE NOTICE that the Township of Tiny is undertaking a Master Plan Class Environmental Assessment (Master Plan) to identify the preferred solutions for the supply of municipal drinking water to existing and future residents. The assessment is considering solutions to increase the resiliency of the township's 16 municipal drinking water systems and to accommodate the anticipated growth.

The Master Plan follows the requirements of the Municipal Engineers Association (MEA) Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (as amended in 2023).

Public Information Centre (PIC) No. 2 will be held in-person and virtually to provide an opportunity for the public to review and provide input on the water infrastructure alternative solutions. There will be a presentation followed by a question-and-answer period.

Following PIC No. 2, comments will be reviewed, the alternatives for the future direction of the water systems will be evaluated based on the information received, and the preferred solution(s) will be selected.



May 17, 2024 - We all know seniors are living longer than ever before. In the year 1950, average life expectancy was 68 yrs. This year, according to the UN Population Trends, we're living to an average of 83 yrs. We're also becoming more familiar with the term centenarian.

Longer lives are one of society's remarkable collective achievements. They reflect significant advances in social and economic development as well as in health. Additional years provide the chance to pursue new activities such as further education, a new career or a long-neglected passion. May 7, 2024 - Ottawa, ON - Doug Shipley, Member of Parliament for Barrie-Springwater-Oro-Medonte, introduced Private Member's Bill, C-389 (The Improving Accessibility to Automated External Defibrillators Act). Bill C-389 seeks to eliminate the application of the GST/HST from the sale of AEDs, as well as kits containing AEDs, and parts and services for AEDs. This will increase the accessibility and affordability of these lifesaving devices. "We know that making defibrillators easily accessible in public buildings such as hockey arenas and airports has the potential to save thousands of lives," said MP Shipley. "In my community alone, 51 lives have been saved in the past twenty years thanks to the County of Simcoe Paramedics Services' public access defibrillators program."

According to the Heart and Stroke Foundation of Canada, as many as 45,000 Canadians experience a sudden cardiac arrest each year - and 80% occur outside of a hospital setting. With each passing minute of cardiac arrest, the probability of survival declines by up to 10%. Defibrillation improves survival rates significantly if delivered in the first few minutes. AEDs combined with CPR increases survival rates to 50% or more. 'We should be doing everything we can to get these lifesaving devices in as many places as possible," said MP Shipley. "This legislation will be a game changer for individuals living in rural communities who may wish to purchase an AED for their home, farm, or cottage, who currently do not have access to an AED." Springwater Council Says It's Time To 'Drive the Bus' on Boundary Talks

May 17, 2024 - It wasn't the most idyllic route to take, but in the end all seven members of Springwater Township council voted to "drive the bus."

The ride Wednesday night started out rough when Coun. Brad Thompson threw cold water on a recommendation from the township's director of planning and development to issue a request for proposal (RFP) to "seek input from qualified professions, including, but not limited to, demographers, economists, engineers and planners, to provide a locally focused growth management model to determine opportunities for expansion beyond established 'settlement area' boundaries."

The recommendation came out of a report that was requested by council at its May 1 meeting.

At that meeting, Springwater council voted against participating in any meeting with a provincial land facilitator regarding the City of Barrie's boundary expansion proposal until it received a staff report that gave them the information they thought they needed to make an informed decision.

"It's time for us to stop wasting taxpayer money, stop spending time on these things and get in the room with a provincial land facilitator and work out something that's reasonable and beneficial to all parties," Thompson said.

Sensing fireworks on the horizon, Springwater Mayor Jennifer Coughlin tried a conciliatory approach.

approach. "I'm still going to try, for myself anyway, to separate what's being asked here from the negotiations with the City of Barrie," she said. "I think the request, growth and economic viability within the township, is something I think is simply a responsibility of us." Coughlin said now that the Midhurst Secondary

Plan, which was the township's focus for many years,

has come to fruition, what's next?

She didn't wait for anyone else to respond. "While I agree that there are opportunities that are continually brought forward to us, I find us to

be almost reactionary to those," the mayor said. "I think that it is absolutely the responsibility of this municipality to come up with and design and lead. "Drive the bus, not get run over by it."

As for the negotiations with Barrie, she acknowledged they are moving ahead, but she doesn't want the RFP and the negotiations with Barrie to be

tied together. "I don't think that us going out and defining our future is in reaction to what's happening from Barrie and the province," Coughlin said. "Regardless of whether that was happening or not, this is the responsible path forward."

The mayor asked Deputy Mayor George Cabral if the special meeting he was proposing was specific to negotiations with the City of Barrie.

"That would be specific to what our position is going to be and hopefully at that meeting we will be able to come to some consensus," Cabral answered. "I don't see us bartering with the City of Barrie, to be quite honest with you, and I'm looking at Coun. Thompson.

"I see us reaching out to the province and showing the province that Springwater Township is not only capable but willing to address every need the province pushes our way," the deputy mayor added.

For 90 minutes, council debated — sometimes hotly — the merits of the recommendation to issue an RFP, which staff estimated would cost between \$100,000 and \$150,000, based on a similar one being done in New Tecumseth.

"Going forth with such a study, what we would be looking at is, we have our settlement area boundaries, but are there areas within the boundaries, and maybe just outside the boundaries, that could be developed sooner, in a more responsible and sequential manner," Doug Herron, Springwater's director of planning and development, told council.

"I think the underlying tone of the entire report is this is a good thing. It allows us to sit down and look at our own future and devise policies for growth for our own future," he added.

Herron said the study would help the township devise its own internal structure and how it would build the township organization itself to meet that growth so it's ready for it and not simply try to respond to it all the time.

"That's the benefit," he said.

Herron included the recommendation in the report 'Potential Future Options and Areas for Growth and Economic Viability within the Township'.

His direction from council was to:

- Identify potential areas for increased residential and industrial development beyond current settlement area boundaries
- Explore potential locations for 'special economic zones' where collaboration with neighbouring municipalities may be realized
- Evaluate current municipal cross-border servicing agreements across Ontario
- Consider collaboration with the County of Simcoe regarding a regional water and wastewater infrastructure model that would support further development of employment land.

At the end of the night, council voted unanimously to issue the RFP.

The special meeting of council has been scheduled for Thursday, May 23 beginning at 4:30 p.m. at the township's administration centre on Nursery Road.

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

Springwater Burning Through Cash To Build New Fire Hall

May 16, 2024 - When the contract to build a new fire hall in Springwater Township was first awarded last May, the cost was \$7,784,489.

Six months later, it went up \$1,628,950 when the original contract was terminated and the secondlowest bidder, Pegah Construction, was awarded the contract for \$9,413,439.

Last night, Springwater council approved another \$1,750,000 for the new fire hall, bringing the final cost, as of now, to \$11,616,006.

That's \$3,831,517 — almost 50 per cent — more than the original contract for the project, located at 1132 Snow Valley Rd., at Highway 26.

Some members of council were not happy with the news.

"I do have concerns in general about our RFP (request-for-proposal) process and the fact that on the first one, we awarded an RFP that couldn't actually do the job without a significant amount of extra funding so we pulled back," said Coun. Danielle Alexander.

creep' — referring to how a project's requirements tend to increase over a project's life-cycle.

"To have this amount of scope creep without even having shovels in the ground concerns me," the councillor said.

Other members of council voiced similar concerns. Coun. Phil Fisher said it was a "pretty serious issue," but stopped short of blaming anyone. Instead, he took the disappointing news in stride, deciding to look at the situation as a cautionary note for future endeavours.

"I think this serves as a warning to us," he said. "We need to really think as we embark on the next project, how are we going to manage this. I see this a problem not on any individual, but it's a problem that just can't be repeated on a large scale."

Mayor Jennifer Coughlin agreed.

"I think it's been 10 years now since I've been sitting here and I think it was under \$3 million the first time it was brought to us," she said. "Two point two, then 5.7 and then 7.9 — it just keeps going up and up and

During those discussions, it was brought to the township's attention that there was other work required that was not in the original scope of work for the project.

The required works that were excluded:

- Supply and installation of a culvert along the entrance to the property
- Construction of the apparatus bay driveway connection to Snow Valley Road
- Supply of all granular material
- Change in hydro connection (from pole mounted to a pad-mounted transformer).

Township staff have estimated that the additional costs would be just over \$1 million.

The big-ticket items include construction of the apparatus bay driveway (\$317,000); supply of granular material, which was originally to be supplied from township pits, but was found to be unsuitable for the project (\$380,000); and the change in the hydro connection (\$280,000).

Additionally, Schmidt said, there was no contingency fund allocated in the contract.

Contingency fees are typically between 10 and 15 per cent of a project's total cost. The township is suggesting a contingency fee of about seven per cent, or almost \$680,000 for this project. The contingency will cover costs for approved additional work. The contractor has recommended that the following extra work be included in the project: Building layout changes, which include an additional 34 square metres to the building footprint and changes to the mezzanine layout Additional site and exterior work including additional sidewalks, line painting, snow storage area, garbage enclosure, three additional parking spots and concrete aprons.

so now we've substantially, \$1.7 million is a big number in terms of the overall budget of this project, she added. "We're not talking about a one per cent increase — we're talking a big increase." Alexander said she is also concerned about 'scope Coughlin added.

According to Jeff Schmidt, the township's chief administrative officer, Springwater has been working with Pegah since last November to move the project forward.



The extra work is estimated at \$435,712.

The recommended work, in addition to the required work, totals about \$1.5 million.

Council's approval of \$1.75 million provides the township with some flexibility in the budget to consider any other recommended changes by the contractor and not have to seek additional funding. According to Schmidt, the construction company has applied for a building permit and is ready to begin construction in June.

Springwater Council Meeting Highlights - May 15

Submitted by By Township of Springwater Heritage Park Sign Refurbishment

Council has approved the refurbishment of a sign at Heritage Park at an estimated cost of \$6,381. The sign will include a commemorative plaque honouring George Allen, a long-time community volunteer. The project will be included in the 2025 budget and will be installed before the park's 25th anniversary. Scarlett Line Improvements

On April 23, Scarlett Line was restricted to local traffic between Whetham Road and McDonald Road due to deteriorating road conditions. As a result, Council has approved the rehabilitation of 2.2 km of Scarlett Line from Whetham Road North to Flos Road 10 East. The work will include the pulverization of the existing surface, the addition of new granular to restore the shape of the road surface and a double surface treatment. It is anticipated the work will be completed later this summer or in the early fall and is expected to cost approximately \$225,000, which has been re-allocated from the 2024 Capital Budget.

Fire Station – Status Update

Council has approved an additional \$1,750,000 for the Fire Station located at 1132 Snow Valley Road. The additional funding will be used for:

• The supply and installation of a culvert along the entrance to the property;

- Construction of the apparatus bay driveway connection to Snow Valley Road;
- Supply of all granular material;
- Changes in the hydro connection; and,
- A contingency provision of approximately 7% of the total project costs.

The additional funding will be drawn from development charges and debt.

Potential Future Options for Growth and **Economic Viability**

Council has directed staff to issue an RFP for a

consultant to determine opportunities for settlement area expansions within the Township. Additionally, a new Committee of Council will be created with a mandate to work with the consultant, as well as further explore four key items:

• Evaluate current municipal cross-border servicing agreements across Ontario.

Consider collaboration with the County of Simcoe regarding a Regional water and wastewater infrastructure model that would support further development of employment lands.

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May 16, 2024 - Happy Victoria Day!!! And a happy day for those of us that love the outdoors, whether that is hiking, kayaking, or camping, as it is the unofficial start to summer outdoor activities. Get out and enjoy that lovely May weather.

While I love the amazing Simcoe County Forests, let's be honest, they are all the same. Straight rows of pine and a lot of monotony. Or so I thought. I had also erroneously thought that there were no new trails within an hour of home that I had not already explored. Well, color me bad, because I heard whispers of a very local forest that I had never been to that boasted old forests, a fast-flowing river, and unique artwork on the trail. So here I am, parked off Rosemount Road near Waubaushene at the Sturgeon River Trail, a short 2.4 km in and out trail that offers many additional trails to increase your distance. If you are heading south, you can park at the first parking area, but as there were several vehicles here, I continued to the second parking area which is much smaller, but I had it all to myself.

This is when the magic occurs. The trail is easy to follow, and my footfalls are softened by soft green moss underfoot. There is no sign of those straight rows of pines, and instead I am in a forest of beech, maple and basswood, as well as abundant undergrowth of blue forget-me-nots and soft purple long-spur violets. The area is almost tremulous with the amount of birdsong, from warblers, thrushes and woodpeckers. Make sure to take the first right in the path, as this will lead you out to the bluff overlooking

the sturgeon river. I was initially startled by the stump carved with a woman's face and covered in stylized butterflies, but quickly became intrigued by the remarkable and beautiful artwork placed along the trail. I was inspired by the far-sighted oracle, the hard-nosed quibbler and the flightless whinger, all birds not found in nature. The clever word plays, and beautiful displays centered on indigenous and environmental themes and were obviously created with love and passion.

Once past this beautiful section of trail, you come out onto the bluff. I stayed to the right until taking a quick left onto a smaller forest trail. It is here that you can really hear the gurgling of the fastflowing water. Continue down some steep but easily



navigable trails until you come to the bottom of the bluff and touch the cold water of the Sturgeon River. The light bounces like crystals off the small rapids, as the water tumbles over and around the rocks and deadfalls. I loved that some enterprising soul hung two camp chairs from a tree just waiting for someone to take a seat and soak in that sound of nature. Soul soothing indeed. I took a much-needed moment of silence, and after trailing my hands in that cold clear water, I headed back up the bluff using a very steep trail. I continued along the bluff edge until re-connecting to my original trail and heading back out. A remarkable trail suitable for all users, though parents and pet owners should be vigilant on the top of the bluff. Enjoy this amazing trail.

SUCCULENT SHRIMP TACOS WITH CHUNKY AVOCADO SALSA – A FRESH TAKE ON TRADITIONAL TACOS May 21, 2024 - Get ready to elevate your taco game with this dish inspired by coastal California cuisine. Not only is

this recipe a feast for the senses, but it also packs a nutritional punch whether served as a main at lunch or dinner or as an appetizer at your next backyard, beach or dock party.



Ingredients:

- 1 lb (454 g) shrimp, peeled and deveined
- 1 tablespoon (15 ml) olive or coconut oil

1 teaspoon (5 ml) smoked paprika or chili powder
2 cloves garlic minced or ¼ teaspoon (1.25 ml) garlic powder

- 2 ripe avocados, peeled, pitted and diced
- 1 red bell pepper, seeded and diced
- ¹/₄ cup (63 ml) red onion, thinly sliced
- ¼ cup (63 ml) fresh cilantro, chopped
- Juice of 1-2 limes
- Salt and pepper to taste
- 8 small wheat or corn tortillas

• Optional toppings: shredded lettuce, sour cream, hot sauce

Instructions:

1. In a bowl, combine the shrimp with the olive or coconut oil, smoked paprika or chili powder, and fresh garlic or garlic powder.

2. To make the avocado salsa, gently mix in a bowl the avocado, red pepper, red onion, cilantro and lime juice. Season with salt and pepper to taste.

3. Cook the shrimp in a skillet over medium-high

heat or on the BBQ for 2-3 minutes per side or until pink and opaque.

4. To assemble the tacos, place a few shrimp on each tortilla and top with a generous spoonful of the avocado salsa.

5. If desired, serve the tacos with shredded lettuce, sour cream and hot sauce.

If you have driven down Wilson lately you may have noticed some activity going on at the two new subdivisions. At the last council meeting approval was given to remove the hold designation on the Estates of Anten Mills. The balance of the subdivision, another 35 homes are subject to a two year monitoring of septic / effluent. At a recent council meeting a motion by Councillor Thompson was approved whereby \$1000 has been allocated for the repairs to the community billboard sign along Wilson. In the near future the sign will be taken out of service hopefully for not too long of time for the necessary repairs. Penetang Development Charges Update Tries To Untangle **Province's Homebuilding Bills**

May 10, 2024 - In the pretzel of the current development charges landscape, Penetanguishene council and residents were treated to the untangled explanation of how it all makes sense.

An update on a 10-year development charge background study was provided to Penetanguishene council by Stefan Krzeczunowicz, associate partner with Hemson Consulting Ltd.

"Development charges are charges that are imposed on development to pay for growth-related capital costs - it's capital costs only, not operating expenditures - and only to the extent that they are related to expanding or installing new infrastructure and facilities to meet the servicing needs of new development in Penetanguishene," Krzeczunowicz explained.

He added: "The principle here is that growth should pay for itself so that the burden of paying for new infrastructure and new facilities is not borne by your existing taxpayers."

As Penetanguishene's current development charge bylaw is due to expire in September, the study aimed to address the town's history of development charges, current and projected calculations, the breakdown of the amounts, and how those charges compare to other municipalities.

However, throwing a wrench into the works was recent legislation by the province through Bill 23, More Homes Built Faster Act in 2022, which introduced mandatory exemptions related to certain housing, and more recently the proposed Bill 185.

"A few weeks ago the government released a new Bill 185: Cutting Red Tape to Build More Homes Act, which reversed some of the Bill 23 changes and made some other changes as well," said Krzeczunowicz. "The development charge exemption for affordable housing, which was introduced by Bill 23 but never brought into force, is now proposed to become effective on June 1 of this year."

Forecasted development growth levels, according to Krzeczunowicz, are "around about 80 new housing units a year, and about 55 new jobs in the town per year over that (10-year) period, which is equivalent to about 2,000 square metres of new non-residential building space"

A chart showed council a summary breakdown of growth-related capital programs as divided by services. Krzeczunowicz noted that the gross costs of all projects over the approximate 10-year period amounted to roughly \$182 million. "A significant component of those costs, about \$166 million, is going to benefit your existing residents and cannot be included in the charge calculations."

Following the numbers was a pie chart which showed a 43-percent slice allotted to parks and recreation, as per calculated draft residential charges.

"The maximum charge you could impose on a single or semi-detached unit is about \$25,500; about \$20,500 for a townhouse; and almost \$17,000 for an apartment," said Krzeczunowicz. "Currently the town imposes a charge of just over \$22,000 for a single detached unit. The newly calculated charge is about \$3,500 or 16 per cent higher. You can

By: Derek Howard, Local Journalism Initiative that most of the increases can be found in the parks and recreation service and to a lesser extent the stormwater service."

When asked to elaborate on the parks and recreation slice, Krzeczunowicz replied: "If you look at the gross cost of the parks and recreation capital program, you'll see it's about \$47.5 million. About \$45 million of that relates to a proposed multi-use recreation centre.

"It's assumed right now that that MMRC facility would replace the current PMCC and possibly the curling club that exist right now," Krzeczunowicz added. "Only the addition portion, the expansion portion of that facility has been included in the development charge. Nevertheless, that still represents a significant cost: \$7.8 million."

Krzeczunowicz also revealed comparison charts for residential and non-residential rates, per single and semi detached units. Penetanguishene's current and calculated charges ranked at the bottom of both lists, with Tiny Township in last place and Midland also comparable to Penetanguishene.

"Most of the really high charges in Simcoe County can be found in the faster-growing southern portions of the county and in parts of Barrie; but even in the context of the northern municipalities Penetanguishene charges are quite low," said Krzeczunowicz. "Note also that Midland's charge needs to be updated by the end of the year too. If your experience is anything to go by, Midland's charge will probably increase.

"The non-residential charge we've calculated is \$143 per square metre (roughly 20 per cent or \$24 increase) of new building floor space, and it's almost all related to the water, sewer, stormwater and roads services," said Krzeczunowicz.

In conclusion, Krzeczunowicz said that the consultants would prepare a development charge background study and draft bylaw for release in mid-June, followed by a public meeting. Their hope, he stated, was to have the bylaw passed by mid-August before the September deadline.

During the following committee of the whole meeting, Coun. Bonita Desroches pulled an item out of the council information package regarding a mid-April announcement of the Community Sport and Recreation Infrastructure Fund as part of this year's budget.

"It's pretty exciting," Desroches stated. "There will be funding coming through the province for repairs or new facilities that are required in communities. The information will be released in the summer of 2024, so I'm anxiously awaiting to see the details about that."

The 10-year development charge background study progress update from Hemson Consulting Ltd. can be located on the agenda page of the Town of Penetanguishene website.

OPP LAY CHARGES IN TWO-YEAR FRAUD INVESTIGATION THAT RESULTED IN OVER \$489,000 IN LOSSES

10-May-2024 (ORILLIA, ÓN) - The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) has charged two individuals following a two-year fraud investigation related to pool installations across the County of Simcoe.

Between February 1, 2022, and November 27, 2023, the OPP received numerous reports of fraud in several detachment areas involving a pool and landscape company. Clients experienced numerous delays and misdirected communications. The clients' backyards would either be left in disarray with improper installation or, in most cases, the work never started.

Investigations revealed that the accused used the company to defraud more than 16 different clients, amounting to over \$489,000 in losses.

Matthew TAYLER, 46-year-old from Barrie, has been arrested and charged with:

- Fraud over \$5000 14 counts
- Obtaining by false pretences over \$5000 14 counts

• Mischief over \$5000 - 3 counts

Jaime GALIPEAU, 47-year-old from Barrie, has been arrested and charged with:

- Fraud over \$5000 14 counts
- Obtaining by false pretences over \$5000

Both the accused have been released on an Undertaking and will appear before the Ontario Court of Justice in Midland on June 20, 2024.

The OPP Central Region Fraud Unit, Huronia West Crime Unit, and Southern Georgian Bay Crime Unit are continuing this investigation.

OPP Investigators Seeking Assistance In Solving Mischief to Hydro One Equipment in Georgian Bay Township

10-May-2024(GEORGIAN BAY TOWNSHIP, ON)- Investigators from the Southern Georgian Bay OPP Detachment are seeking assistance from the public after looking into a mischief complaint from May 9, 2024 of firearms being discharged resulting in an estimated \$50,000. worth of damage to Hydro One power lines and transmission towers on the trail on the north side of White's Fall Road, Georgian Bay Township.

WEAPONS AND DRUGS SEIZED AFTER SEARCH WARRANT EXECUTION IN RELATION TO AGGRAVATED ASSAULT INVESTIGATION

Charges Upgraded to Second Degree Murder

(WASAGA BEACH, ON) - The Huronia West Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) has upgraded the charges against an accused from aggravated assault to second degree murder in the Town of Wasaga Beach.

On February 25, 2024, members of the Huronia West Detachment responded to a report of an unconscious individual in critical condition on Homewood Ave.



On March 6, 2024, a search warrant was executed on the accused's residence. The accused was arrested with ten charges including aggravated assault, and items were seized including weapons and cocaine.

On May 6, 2024, the victim succumbed to their injuries and was pronounced deceased.

After further investigation, on May 8, 2024, David ZAMIDA, 46-year-old of Wasaga Beach, was charged under the Criminal Code (CC) with the following offences:

• Second Degree Murder, section 235(1)

- · Possession of Firearm or Ammunition Contrary
- to Prohibited Order Six Counts, section 117.01(1)
- · Unauthorized Possession of a Firearm Four

Counts, section 91(1) • Careless Storage of a Firearm, Weapon, Prohibited

Device or Ammunition, section 86(1) • Possession of a Prohibited Device or Ammunition

- Three Counts, section 92(2)

· Assault - Two Counts, section 266

• Fail to Comply Undertaking, section 145(4)

The accused was held for a bail court appearance at the Ontario Court of Justice in Barrie on May 9, 2024.

The Huronia West Crime Unit is continuing this investigation under the direction of the OPP Criminal Investigation Branch (CIB).

LOCKDOWN AT LOCAL SECONDARY SCHOOL AFTER REPORTS OF A FIREARM.

(ORILLIA, ON) - On May 8, 2024 at about 1:36 p.m. officers of the Orillia detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) responded to a weapons call at Orillia Secondary School. Information was that a student may have had a firearm at the school.

At 1:38 p.m. officers began arriving on scene and entered the school. The school was placed into lockdown and surrounding schools placed in a hold and secure. Officers then began working with school staff taking steps to ensure the safety of everyone at the school. The investigation led police to a young person who had used a social media application to share a photo of what appeared to be a firearm. The young person was brought into police custody a short time later and the lockdown/hold and secure was lifted. It was determined the object in the photo was not a real firearm, rather a smaller detailed replica of a firearm.

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
