June 17, 2024 - It is with great pleasure and admiration for our EDHS students and their twins to announce yet another successful learning experience for everyone involved. Our exchange this year was with Sagkeeng First Nation (formally known as Fort Alexander) located at the mouth of the Winnipeg River and Lake Winnipeg.

In 1990, then Chief of Manitoba First Nations, Phil Fontaine went on national television and spoke about his experience in the Fort Alexander Residential

his experience in the Fort Alexander Residential School. His harrowing accounts awoke many in the country to a history that had been suppressed by our federal government and the church organizations

that administered the program.

When teaching about residential schools, it is just as important to teach about the strength of Indigenous communities and the strong character of their community members. There is no better way to do this than through an exchange.

When in Sagkeeng, we learned that this community was the first to establish their own school board

which now operates a beautiful elementary, middle and high school. Each school is filled with visuals, activities, teachers and community members all of which reflect the strength of their culture back onto their students and guests. We were welcomed with music, dance, regalia and stories. It was very apparent to all of us how unique and valuable Indigenous culture is to Canada.

Our students were treated so well. Our Sagkeeng hosts shared important cultural locations, ribbon skirt and shirt making, a sweat lodge right on the school site, a community barbecue, and of course the opportunity to meet and enjoy the company of their students.

Additionally, the group traveled to Winnipeg to visit The Forks Market, where the Red River meets the Assiniboine, the Manitoba Museum and the Canadian Museum of Human Rights (featured on the back of our ten dollar bill). Personally, I very much enjoyed meeting Ian Bushy, Minister of Municipal and Northern Relations. Mr. Bushy is a member of the Hollow Water First Nation and is

very proud to serve under Wab Kinew, Canada's first Indigenous Premier.

Our students were excellent hosts during the Southern Ontario leg of the experience. We hit all of the whistle stops and also some of the quieter backwaters of our region. It was great to see the acquaintances made in Manitoba solidify into friendships during the Ontario week. Too many beautiful moments to tell, but in the end there was one heck of a football game on Beach One, while the sun set and small groups of youth sat and cherished their remaining moments together.

Again this year, I would like to express my gratitude and also my admiration for our community. There are many individuals, local businesses, corporations, service clubs and government agencies who support this program. We continue to offer this program to students for \$250. Parents also are a big part of it. Thank you to all who volunteered in helping to feed and transport our hungry travelers.

No guarantees for next year yet, but I understand Bella Coola, B.C. is lovely in springtime!



Province to Facilitate 'Confidential' Talks on Barrie's Boundary Plans

June 2, 2024 - It's not known when or where or what will be on the agenda, but the municipalities involved in the City of Barrie's boundary expansion proposal will be meeting sooner rather than later.

And they'll be joined at the table by a new player the County of Simcoe.

"The Office of the Provincial Land and Development Facilitator (OPLDF) will facilitate discussions between the City of Barrie, Township of Oro-Medonte, Township of Springwater and the County of Simcoe," Bianca Meta, press secretary for Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing Paul Calandra, said in an email to BarrieToday late Friday

"Senior leadership from each municipality will be invited to attend focused, confidential, facilitation sessions," Meta added.

None of the leaders of the municipalities involved would talk about the discussions when contacted by BarrieToday.

The fact that the meetings will be closed to the public doesn't sit well with some locals.

Last Tuesday, the community group 'Friends of the Future', based in Oro-Medonte Township, organized a petition blitz in Oro-Medonte and Barrie that gathered almost 800 signatures from people who are opposed to the City of Barrie's boundary expansion

They believe their efforts represent an important voice in the community.

"Friends of the Future believes that public participation in meetings about the proposed annexation is essential for maintaining trust," said member Jane Voorheis. "Greater transparency and collaboration with municipal leaders will strengthen democracy and improve negotiations.

"Open meetings would enhance accountability and keep residents informed," she added.

Bryen Wakeman, an Oro-Medonte resident for 40 years, agrees. He was signing the Friends of the

By: Wayne Doyle, Local Journalism Initiative Future's petition at the old fire hall in Shanty Bay last Tuesday evening as he's not in favour of Barrie's proposal.

Wakeman is also not in favour of private meetings on such important issues and thinks closed-door meetings are a problem.

"They should be open, people should be able to see and hear what's being discussed," he said after signing the petition, providing an official, public declaration of where he stood on the issue.

"There's a lot being demanded of the population as a whole yet we're not involved in those discussions," Wakeman added. "There's very little input from the people who are most affected."

On Nov. 6 last year, Barrie Mayor Alex Nuttall made a presentation to the provincial standing committee on heritage, infrastructure and cultural policy, regional governance and Bill 124, that included a proposal to expand the boundaries of the City of Barrie into the townships of Oro-Medonte and Springwater.

Nuttall has said the boundary expansion is required because the city currently does not have sufficient employment land.

Oro-Medonte and Springwater had vastly different reactions to the news.

On Nov. 8, after hearing Nuttall's plan, Oro-Medonte council said it was "not comfortable" with the boundary request from the City of Barrie.

In mid-February, Oro-Medonte council voted to support a report from the township's planner which called for increased co-operation between the two municipalities and presented alternatives to Barrie's initial proposal.

"I think it's an excellent report and gives us definitely a path forward to a sustainable and amicable solution," said Oro-Medonte Township Mayor Randy Greenlaw. "We will continue discussions with the City of Barrie.'

On April 17, during a special session, council authorized staff to seek a mediator to help them solve Barrie's boundary expansion plans.

On Nov. 15, Springwater council voted unanimously to "terminate discussions" with Barrie "regarding the city's proposal for boundary adjustments and crossborder servicing.'

On March 6, Springwater council voted to reverse that decision somewhat, as council voted to hold talks with the Barrie officials, but only regarding cross-border servicing.

Council demanded there be no discussion with Barrie about boundary expansion.

At the March 20 meeting, Coughlin told council that township officials had a meeting with Nuttall to discuss the possibility of a partnership and were rebuffed.

"It was made very clear that we have nothing to offer if not land," Coughlin said at the time. "They are not looking for a fee-for-service or 'a la carte' service to their pipes, their treatment facility and their water.

"If we're not talking about boundary adjustment, the conversation with Barrie no longer exists," she

mid-April, neighbouring In Oro-Medonte announced it would contact the provincial land and development facilitator to request assisted mediation regarding Barrie's boundary expansion plans.

At its May 1 meeting, Springwater council voted against participating in any meeting with a provincial land facilitator regarding Barrie's proposal until it received a staff report that gave them the information they thought they needed to make an informed decision.

On May 15, Springwater council received the report it requested and a special meeting of council was scheduled for May 23.

Following the closed portion of that meeting, Springwater council passed a resolution that directed the mayor, deputy mayor and chief administrative officer to participate in any future provincially led facilitation process on the matter should a Provincial Land and Development Facilitator be appointed.

Springwater Councillors Divided Over Ombudsman's Report

Working with a short bench, Springwater Township council moved through Wednesday night's meeting in rapid succession.

In less than 40 minutes, council — without Mayor Jennifer Coughlin and Councillors Danielle Alexander and Anita Moore — was in and out of chambers with barely a word of conflict or debate.

Barely.

Only one item, the final report from the Ontario Ombudsman regarding a closed meeting investigation, merited discussion, however brief it may have been.

Coun. Brad Thompson said he contacted the ombudsman, who told him that all of the items that were discussed at a special meeting of council on Aug. 2, 2023 could have been discussed in open session.

The fact that they weren't, Thompson said, was a major misstep of council.

"Over the past year and a half, on this council, there has been a lot of talk about openness and transparency," Thompson said. "I think on this occasion it would have benefited our public, the voters and our taxpayers to have been able to be part of this process, to see how we voted and to see what comments we made in these closed meetings.

"We really missed an opportunity," he added.

Coun. Phil Fisher disagreed. He said he read the report and was quite happy with its conclusion.

"Maybe I interpreted it differently. It seemed to exonerate this council from talking about those subjects within closed session," Fisher said. "I actually disagree, Coun. Thompson. I think we were well within our rights to discuss those topics and I think the ombudsman actually confirms that."

Fisher invited the public to read the report for themselves. Coun. Matt Garwood echoed Thompson's sentiments.

"While the report clearly states that this council did not contravene the Municipal Act in regards to having the discussion, it doesn't mean we should have had the discussion," he said. "Just because there is a line doesn't mean we should go right to it."

The meeting that is the subject of the ombudsman's report was a special council meeting that was held at 3 p.m. and was requested by petition from Deputy Mayor George Cabral and Councillors Alexander, Moore and Fisher.

There were two other council meetings on that day — a

presentation from the Ontario Provincial Police at 5 p.m. representing the majority of the taxpayers and you have and the regularly scheduled council meeting that followed at 6:30 p.m.

The open-session agenda for the 3 p.m. meeting indicated that, as requested by petition, council would discuss a rainbow crosswalk project and a drag story-time event hosted by the Springwater Public Library in open session, before discussing three items in closed session:

- Employment matters Springwater Public Library (identifiable individual)
- Hiring economic development assistant (labour relations or employee negotiations)

Rainbow crosswalk project — irregularities (identifiable individual and labour relations and employee negotiations)

In open session, council discussed perceived irregularities related to a rainbow crosswalk project, including different understandings of what financial responsibility a local high school would have, and directed staff to prepare a report on this subject.

Council then discussed an event arranged by the Springwater Public Library, at which a drag queen would read children's stories to an audience.

Fisher kicked off the discussion.

"Before I start today, I'd like the public to know that the management of the Springwater library were requested to meet with council today to be transparent on matters pertaining directly to the taxpayer-funded institution they manage," he said. "They have decided to decline that request.

"It has come to the surprise of many residents that the library operates separately from Springwater council," Fisher added. "Other than some financial budgetary oversight, they act autonomously.'

According to the Public Libraries Act (PLA) of Ontario, a copy of which was given to each councillor when they started their term, Thompson said, a public library is an independent entity under the management and control of a board.

A library reports to its board, not the municipality, so it has no obligation to appear before a council or provide specifics on how it spends its funds.

Fisher then railed about a program called Drag Queen Storytime, a program that was originally scheduled to be held in 2019, but was delayed due to the COVID pandemic.

"For those councillors who have shown they condone this in our community, I want you to know you are not let virtue signalling take the place of stable governance," Fisher said.

Virtue signalling is described as the public expression of opinions or sentiments intended to demonstrate one's good character or social conscience or the moral correctness of one's position on a particular issue.

"I know I speak for many residents who want their tax dollars funding a library that champions literacy and learning," Fisher said. "Let's turn the library back into the institution it was meant to be."

While Fisher's opinion of what a library should champion may be welcome to some, it's another place where it's hands off for politicians.

According to the PLA, "a board shall appoint a chief executive officer who shall have general supervision over and direction of the operations of the public library and

At one point in the discussion, Thompson asked Jeff Schmidt, Springwater's chief administrative officer, if council was breaking any rules talking about the library.

"I would suggest, because council does appoint the library board, the members of the board, there could be conversation as it relates to that," Schmidt said. "As it relates to dictating what the library does, programming and such, (it's) not your prerogative."

Council was forced to wrap up this portion as the 5 p.m. special session of council with the OPP was about to begin. Council returned back to closed session following the end of its regularly scheduled council meeting at 7:59

According to the ombudsman's report, council continued to discuss the high school representative's actions and then it discussed the economic development assistant item. Lastly, they returned to discussing the Springwater Public Library.

Some council members shared their concerns about the conduct of a specific individual in relation to the drag-queen story-time event, which had previously been discussed in open session.

Council also raised questions about the transparency obligations of the Springwater Public Library Board and whether it had a code of conduct.

After a question was raised about the township's ability to dissolve the library board, a councillor suggested that that line of questioning did not relate to an identifiable individual, and asked whether such a discussion should be held in open session.

Council returned to open session at 9:21 p.m.

Amos Arbour- Understated Sports Legend

Joseph Amos Hermas 'Butch' Arbour [January 26, 1895 - November 1, 1943]. Amos was a native of Waubaushene, Ontario. At 5'6" and 160lbs, Arbour played for the Victoria Harbour Station in 1914-15

A left winger, Amos played two seasons in the National Hockey Association and six seasons in the National Hockey League for the Montreal Canadiens where he won a Stanley Cup in 1916.

The Portland Rosebuds won the Pacific Coast title and travelled east to meet the Canadiens. It was the first time a team outside Canada would compete for the Stanley Cup.

Portland arrived in Montreal on March 18th, 1916 and had a brief skate at the Westmount Arena. The players were weary from the five day train trip east and appeared to put little effort into the light practice.

The Rosebuds surprised the Canadiens, blanking them 2-0 thanks to the superb goaltending of Tommy Murray.

The second game was played under Western seven man rules. Two substitutes, Amos Arbour and "Skinner" Poulin, came through with goals as the Canadiens downed the Rosebuds 2-1 to tie the series. Game three a rough one won by the Canadiens 6-3 and Portland won a 6-5 squeaker in game four.

The Westmount Arena was packed for the fifth and final game played under six man rules. The





Canadiens won the match 2-1 as George Vezina was sensational in net for the Canadiens. The winning players received \$238 and the losers \$207 as their share of the gate.

During the summer the Canadiens lost Amos Arbour, "Goldie" Prodgers and Howard McNamara to the Canadian Army.

Amos also played for the Hamilton Tigers and Toronto St. Patricks.

It can't be understated that his biggest contribution was playing and signing up for the 228th Battalion hockey team 1916-17 which was shipped over to London England in 1917.

Integrity Commissioner Slams Springwater

Councillor's 'Petty politics'

Springwater Township's integrity commissioner has had enough of Coun. Phil Fisher's behaviour.

June 15, 2024 In a report that will be delivered at Wednesday's council meeting, integrity commissioner Robert Swayze warned Fisher "that if he continues to aggressively attack other members of council and staff, I will find a contravention of the council code of conduct and may recommend sanctions against him"

Swayze laid out the consequences if Fisher's behaviour does not change.

"I warn him that if he continues with his aggressive approach, I will find that it amounts to harassment of other members of council and/or staff, which is a code rule," Swayze wrote. "I will recommend the imposition of sanctions, such as a reprimand and the suspension of his council salary, (up) to as much as 90 days."

"I've had a chance to thoroughly review the comments from the integrity commissioner," Fisher told BarrieToday in response to the report. "I find the report heavily flawed, however I think it's important the public view the meeting on the 19th."

Swayze's report is a result of three formal complaints he received — one from Fisher against Mayor Jennifer Coughlin; a second from Coun. Brad Thompson against Fisher, and a third from Adrian Graham, chair of the Springwater Library Board, also against Fisher.

Swayze decided to consider all three complaints together, against the objections of Fisher who argued the complaints were unrelated.

"I advised him that, in my opinion, they are related to a divided council mostly caused by his engagement in petty politics." Swayze wrote in his decision.

"I told him that most of my 24 councils work together co-operatively on the business of the municipality, and I rarely hear from them," Swayze added.

According to the report, Fisher's complaint against Coughlin related to an invitation she received from the engineering consultant firm engaged by the township, to a dinner sponsored by the consultant at the Rural Ontario Municipal Association (ROMA) conference, held Jan. 21-23 in Toronto. It was directed at all members of council, but the mayor chose to invite only three members.

"I had two telephone interviews with the mayor and in the first one she gave me the impression that she felt that she had some discretion in whom she could invite," Swayze wrote. "In the second, after some debate at a council meeting, she advised me that she knew that the invitation was directed at all of council."

Swayze wrote that he has spoken with a representative of the consultant and was assured that any future invitations will be addressed directly to all members of council.

The second complaint, made by Thompson against Fisher, was also related to ROMA.

At the Feb. 17 council meeting, Fisher was accused of publicly criticizing Thompson for attending the ROMA conference with his wife, going a day earlier, and using municipal dollars to pay for her stay.

Fisher also accused Thompson of attending the aforementioned consultant-sponsored dinner and not telling him about it.

Thompson denied attending a day earlier and advised that "not a penny of tax dollars was spent on" his wife.

Thompson assumed Fisher's accusations were based on assumptions and not fact.

"I requested Coun. Fisher to tell me where his information came from, but he has not responded to the request," Swayze wrote.

According to the report, Thompson was not at the council meeting to defend himself.

The third complaint was made against Fisher by Adrian Graham, chair of the Springwater Library Board.

According to the complaint, Graham was concerned over public statements made by Fisher about replacing the library with a contract organization and a notice of motion he provided on Nov. 1, 2023, requesting a report from staff to advise on possible alternatives to maintaining a library board.

He never formally brought the notice of motion to council, but library staff members were alarmed by the criticism and about their jobs.

"I consulted with a lawyer colleague who gave the opinion to another municipality that such a proposal would be contrary to the Library Act and I am of the same opinion," Swayze wrote.

The integrity commissioner decided that none of the complaints required an investigation "on the basis of no actual rule in the code (of conduct) having been contravened."

"The complainants have all cited sections of the code, which are general principles contained in the code," he wrote. "However, I repeat my conclusion mentioned above that Coun. Fisher is not working co-operatively with other members of council to the detriment of the function of council in considering business issues."

But there came a time for me to lose what I held so dear. The anti-malaria pill I had to take daily was affecting my health. As May began, I realized that my symptoms had become severe; I needed medical assistance. Unfortunately, the only way to stop taking the drug was to return to Canada (where there is no malaria) and to continue to take the drug for four weeks. I was told I had to return to Canada as quickly as possible.

My Tanzania "family" and I were stunned. My Tanzania Residence Permit doesn't expire until October 2025. We had already decided it would be hard to say goodbye in 2025 and now, with little warning, I had to leave in five months less two days.

I arrived in Canada on May 23. I will take the last dose of this anti-malaria pill on June 20. It will take approximately five days for this drug to clear my system and then I can start to recover.

When I first arrived home, it was a time for me to keep silent. In addition to not feeling well, my grief was so deep. It still is, but as the days go by I'm finding my words. Like Mary, in Luke 2:51, I am treasuring all things in my heart, all the things I saw and heard and learned and loved during my time in Tanzania.

Ecclesiastes 3:8 includes these words: a time to love and a time for peace. God's love and His peace are gifts from His heart to ours.

The picture that accompanies this article was taken in my final moments in Mugeta. I thank God for the love that flows between me and this amazing family. I thank Him that, although there are times we weep, He gave us the gift of laughter for other times; and, that although we may mourn, He created us to be able to dance.

I thank God that He offers us His perfect peace as He walks with us through every matter under heaven. Amen.

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

June 11-13, 2024 - I am often the campsite it sounds like the screams from some massacre occurring uphill at the farm. Luckily the little goats tuck into bed early, otherwise I may have



had nightmares of serial killers.

My first day I drove the one hour to Tobermory. I had hoped to go to the Grotto but discovered that any of the parks on the peninsula require an online parking permit. Unfortunately for me I was unable to obtain one for the days that I was available, but was able to grab a spot for the next day at Lion's Head. For today I explored the Big Tub Lighthouse just minutes from Tobermory, an active lighthouse originally built in 1885. The picturesque white clapboard structure with a red top sites upon dark grey rocks called dolomite, riddled with pocks and crevices and leading down to those famed turquoise waters. The water is crystal clear and darkens to a bright blue as the water deepens out into the Tobermory harbor, and is thus a favorite for scuba divers to explore wrecks. I headed back to my cute little bunkie for the night and prepared for tomorrow's hike.

Lion's Head Provincial park is a beautiful area on the east side of the peninsula, and includes some sections of the popular Bruce Trail. The main loop trail is approximately 18 km long, but my parking reservation was only for four hours, so I settled on the shorter out and back trek to the Lion's Head Lookout, a distance of 4-7 km. The trail itself is considered moderately challenging as it is rugged and will have you staring at your feet to avoid roots and rocks, and the occasional rattler. Make sure

ladybugs, parasitoid wasps, tachinid flies, wolf spiders, and ground beetles that do all the hard work. Be observant. Get to know what the larvae of your friendly insects look like. Plant "flowery friends" in the garden. A suggested practice is to plant: a vegetable, an herb, and a flower in proximity.


Parsley is a great friend of asparagus and peppers. It masks the odor of the host-seeking aphids and asparagus beetle. Not only that, but it also attracts wasps and tachinid flies. Since asparagus is an early crop, planting lower growing parsley is an effective way to use that space underneath.

A big-time tiny helper in your garden is the tachinid fly. Tachinid flies lay their eggs in the caterpillar of cabbage worms, LDD Moth (formerly Gypsy moth), Colorado potato beetles, corn ear worms, cucumber beetles, cutworms, earwigs, Japanese beetles, bean Beetles, sawfly larvae, squash bugs and tobacco budworms. Give yourself a high five, if you have these mighty helpers in your garden!

The combination of calendula and broccoli is successful because the flowers create a sticky substance that attract aphids and traps them there. As a bonus, ladybugs stop by to eat the aphids. A win-win match.

Parsnips and carrots planted with onion, garlic, or leeks are said to ward off carrot root flies; and the smell of carrots or parsnips deters leek moths. Another mutually friendly relationship.

Lavender will attract many pollinators, and when planted near tomatoes and beans will increase the to check out the short side trail to the pothole, a cylindrical hole through solid rock. There is also the devil's cauldron, a deep depression in the rock. As you continue along the trail it becomes more rugged, though with some easy stretches until there you are, on top of the bluff, looking way, way down to those turquoise waters. The view is stunning, out and across the bay to more cliffs on the other side of the water. I could have had a better view, but I resolutely refused to step closer than ten feet from the edge of that precipice, despite a nice couple offering to hold my hand and take me to the edge. Heck no!! Instead



I admired the scenery from my safe spot clinging to a tree, before heading back out to my parking spot.

I ended my solo trip with a quick jaunt over to Sauble falls, then down to Chatsworth to another farm. I could not pass up a walk with an alpaca, and Rosy was the most adorable alpaca who was easy enough to lead, except when she would unexpectedly lay down to roll in the tall grass. Who can blame her, as what girl doesn't like the occasional roll in the hay. It was a quick rinse off with the hose (for the alpaca not me) and then off to see more goats, donkeys and pot belled pigs. A perfect way to end my spontaneous holiday.

Mint confuses flea beetles that enjoy laying their eggs on brassicas. A word of caution, mints are vigorous growers, so better to place them in pots in the garden. Sage (Salvia officinalis) also has a strong enough scent to confuse black flea beetles and cabbage moths from brassicas, as well as carrot flies from carrots.

The planting of wormwood (Artemisia absinthium) is a balm to pollinators. It keeps blackfly aphids from bean crops. Even ants, slugs, snails, mice, deer, and rabbits will avoid its strong odor and harsh taste.

A great combination to plant with lettuce is chives or garlic. Aphids don't like the smell and if you plant alyssum nearby, it will attract hoverflies and lacewings to snack on a meal of aphids.

CONSIDER THIS:

Don't underestimate "flower power" in vegetable gardens. Consider planting flowers like cosmos, lobelias, marigold, tansy, rudbeckia, scabiosa, yarrow and zinnias that work with Mother Nature to attract beneficial insects and pollinators. We can all encourage the good bugs to stick around by offering a habitat for them to thrive.

STRAWBERRY FREEZER JAM WITH VINEGAR BALSAMIC AND ROSEMARY – A BEAUTIFUL ADDITION TO ANY CHARCUTERIE **BOARD**

What to do with the abundance of strawberries showing up at your local farmer's market, road

side stand or favourite green grocer? There are only so many helpings of strawberry shortcake or pie you can eat while still maintaining a healthy diet. Why not pace yourself a little and try this unique take on strawberry jam. No fancy canning is necessary and only a few ingredients are required to make this delicious, sweet and savoury spread bursting with flavour. Strawberry balsamic rosemary jam is the perfect accompaniment to a charcuterie board of hard and soft cheeses and can also be used as a marinade for grilled chicken or fish.

INGREDIENTS

- 2 cups (500 ml) fresh strawberries, mashed
- 1 ½ Tablespoons (23 ml) balsamic vinegar
- 2 Tablespoons (30 ml) fresh lemon juice
- 1 1/2 cups (375 ml) granulated sugar or1 cup (250 ml) maple syrup or honey
- 3 ounces (90 ml) liquid pectin
- ½ teaspoon (2.5 ml) dried thyme
- 2-3 sprigs Fresh rosemary or 1 teaspoon (5 ml) dried rosemary
- ¼ teaspoon (1.25 ml) sea salt
- ¼ teaspoon (1.25 ml) freshly ground black pepper **INSTRUCTIONS**
- 1. Gather mason jars with lids or other freezer safe containers with airtight lids to house your strawberry freezer jam.
- 2. In a medium sized pot or large non-stick frying pan, combine the mashed strawberries, balsamic vinegar, lemon juice, sugar, maple syrup or honey, liquid pectin, fresh or dried rosemary, dried thyme and salt and pepper. Stirring continuously, bring to a boil and mix until all of the ingredients are well combined. Lower heat and continue to stir for 1-2



minutes until slightly thickened. Remove from the cooktop and let cool to room temperature.

- 3. Ladle the strawberry jam mixture into the freezer safe containers.
- 4. Keep the jam in the refrigerator for up to 3 weeks or in the freezer for up to 3 months for maximum
- 5. Serve this savoury freezer jam with a selection of cheeses or use as a marinade for chicken or fish. ENJOY!

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

Midhurst/June 13, 2024 - Today, the City of Barrie, the Township of Oro-Medonte, the Township of Springwater, and the County of Simcoe released the following statement:

The City of Barrie, the Township of Oro-Medonte, the Township of Springwater, and the County of Simcoe are engaged in facilitated discussions, with the intent of developing mutually acceptable approaches to enable growth in the broader region. All avenues will be considered to ensure that any agreement is equitable, balanced, and reflective of the diverse needs across our municipalities. A needs assessment will be undertaken as a foundation to these discussions.

While the facilitation sessions are confidential, providing regular updates to keep our respective communities informed will be paramount. Any potential resolutions that may result from the facilitation process will be considered in an open, transparent forum.

More details will be shared as they become available. The City of Barrie, the Township of Oro-Medonte, the Township of Springwater, and the County of Simcoe remain committed to finding solutions that strengthen our respective communities and improve the lives of those we serve.


