







Weber Foundation transforms community with \$22.5-million donation

July 2, 2024.

On Tuesday July 2, 2024, The Weber Foundation presented major gifts to thirteen local charities, totalling \$22.5-million. The invite-only presentation took place at the Midland Cultural Centre (MCC), an arts and culture organization in Midland, significantly funded by The Weber Foundation.

The Weber Foundation was established in 1997 by Reinhart and Alexandra Weber. Over the past 27 years, the Foundation had donated more than \$28-million to local charities. Together with today's gifts, The Weber Foundation has now donated more than \$50-million.

Reinhart Weber, Chair and benefactor of The Weber Foundation, commented: "We established the Foundation to support and enhance the work of local community charities that provide such outstanding facilities and programming for the people of North

Penetanguishene greenlights new sign for busy intersection

Jul 15, 2024 Whether it opens people's eyes, asks them to apply or advertises a band, Penetanguishene's newly-approved digital sign will soon be placed where the most traffic can see it.

At the recent committee of the whole meeting, council members approved a digital sign project worth \$61,500 plus HST and hydro (estimated \$6,500), inclusive of the foundation and stonework for its first location at Robert Street West and Champlain Road.

According to the accompanying staff report, the design of the look and feel would aim to directly mimic the sign at the entrance of town on CR-93, acting as a secondary 'welcome to town' sign in the new location.

The conceptual engineering design for the doublesided sign, which would also host LED screens, impressed members of council during its discussion.

Coun. Suzanne Marchand was encouraging for its appearance, but questioned the initial location recommended by the finance and corporate services

"I love the look and the design, and I think it's fantastic and I'm glad to have it for our town," said Marchand. "I just wondered if maybe there was any consideration that, in terms of placement, is there an opportunity at our town hall?

In response, Coun. George Vadeboncoeur shared his thought that sign installations could be a multiyear program with the Robert and Champlain intersection appearing first on the list of potential locations.

"I think tongue-in-cheek, the arena was last on the list and that's what I was hoping – that it would be number one or two. I'm hoping this is multi-year," said Vadeboncoeur.

"We made that decision that it was going to be there (Robert & Champlain). Year two, I'm happy to consider a sign at or close to town hall.'

A map with several locations was included in a December signage report which informed the

"The sign is absolutely well done; beautiful," said Coun. Doug Leroux, who added the reason why Robert and Champlain was the first choice. "I know the amount and volume of traffic that comes by there."

Vadeboncoeur also agreed that the sign was "fantastic"; he added that heading into the upcoming budget cycle, knowing the cost of the build would be beneficial compared to the other options presented by staff.

However, his concern rested with the software support for the sign's operation; the question was alleviated by communications and technology coordinator Sarah Dusome who replied with confidence that the annual fee paid would keep the support updated.

The cost of the sign was offset by \$20,000 within the recreation reserve, previously set aside for another project which did not proceed. Lifespan for the outdoor LED portion of the sign was anticipated to last an average of 100,000 hours, or 10 years of operation.

The LED digital signage options report, and conceptual engineering designs, can be located on the agenda page of the Town of Penetanguishene website.

Meetings of Penetanguishene council are held on the second Wednesday of each month, and can be watched live on Rogers TV cable 53 when available, or on the Rogers TV website.



TAKE NOTICE THAT the Town of Penetanguishene has initiated a Zoning By-law Amendment application (File No. Z.A. 2/2024) to the Town's Comprehensive Zoning By- law 2022-17, as amended, for a "Housekeeping Amendment" under Section 34 of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. P.13 on the 8th day of May 2024.

Application No.: Zoning By-law Amendment Z.A. 2/2024

Applicant: Town of Penetanguishene

Location: All Properties in the Town of Penetanguishene

DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSED ZONING BY-LAW AMENDMENT

Council of the Town of Penetanguishene initiated a Zoning By-law Amendment to make minor changes to the Town's Zoning By-law 2022-17, as amended, that are considered housekeeping in nature. The housekeeping changes are intended to clarify the bylaw and make corrections. The following are the proposed changes at a high-level:

- Definitions update for Attached, Structure and Temporary Tent.
- Changes to the provisions for Accessory Buildings or Structures related to their number, height, and setbacks from front yards and other buildings.
- Changes to the provisions for Additional Dwelling Units in a Main Building, and in a Detached Accessory Building.
- Removal of a provision that requires Frontage to be only through a Plan of Subdivision.
- Changes to the regulations for Platforms and Porches and clarity on when they apply.
- Adding a Temporary Tent as a permission in all zones, excluding the Environmental Protection (EP) zone
- Adding the permission for an Additional Dwelling Unit in a Single Detached Dwelling in the Residential Three (R3) Zone.
- Correction of terms within the permitted yard encroachment section.
- Removal of duplicate regulations for accessible parking spaces.
- Updates to eight (8) different exception zones for corrections.
- Corrections to nine (9) Holding Symbols.

PUBLIC MEETING

Pursuant to Section 34 of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, Council of the Town of Penetanguishene will hold a Public Meeting on Wednesday, August 14, 2024, at 7:00 p.m. or as soon thereafter as the matter can be dealt with in the Council Chambers Townhall, 10 Robert Street West, Penetanguishene to consider the proposed changes.

HOW TO PROVIDE FEEDBACK

All comments will be considered up until the Council of the Town of Penetanguishene makes a decision regarding the application. Written comments may be submitted by email to planning@penetanguishene.ca or in writing to the Town of Penetanguishene Planning and Community Development Department, 10 Robert Street West, P.O. Box 5009, Penetanguishene, ON L4R 2G2. If you are submitting letters, faxes, emails, presentations, or other communications with the Town concerning this file, you should be aware that your name and the fact you communicated with the Town will become part of the public record. The Town will also make your communication and any personal information in it available to the public, unless you expressly request the Town to remove it.

APPEAL

If a person or public body would otherwise have an ability to appeal the decision of the Council of the Town of Penetanguishene to the Ontario Land Tribunal but the person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Town of Penetanguishene before the by-law is passed, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision. 

Springwater staff give thumbs up to pit expansion plans

A proposal to extend the life of an aggregate pit on Snow Valley Road in Springwater has received initial approval from township staff.

According to a report that will be presented at Wednesday's township council meeting, prepared by planning services manager Chris Russell, the McColgan Pit, located in the Midhurst area at 1322 and 1368 Snow Valley Rd., has an expected life-span of five more years.

He's recommending council approve applications to amend the township's Official Plan and zoning bylaw to facilitate the expansion and continued extraction of aggregate from it.

The applicant, 1693297 Ontario Inc. (Eisses Brothers Excavating), is looking to secure approvals to continue extraction operations on an adjacent plot of land to the north, municipally known as 1196 Anne St. N.

They are looking for:

• an amendment to Springwater's Official Plan to redesignate the subject land from 'employment' to 'employment exception'.

an amendment to Springwater's zoning bylaw to rezone the subject land from the 'agricultural (A)' to the 'extractive industrial (ME)' zone, with site-specific exceptions, including a 30-metre extractive setback to the adjacent Industrial zoned parcel (1216 Anne St. N.) instead of the required 120-metre setback, a 58-metre setback to the closest residential dwelling (1216 Anne St. N.) instead of the required 150-metre setback and a zero-metre setback between the existing pit and expansion land to permit the extraction of resources within the shared border of the parcels instead of the required 15-metre setback.

"As the expansion lands are currently designated for 'employment' uses within the Midhurst Secondary Plan and zoned agricultural (A) under Bylaw 5000, an Official Plan amendment and zoning-bylaw amendment are needed to consider the applicant's requested expansion plans," Russell wrote in his report.

The proposed extraction of aggregate material from the subject land is considered to be a temporary and interim use of the land, he added.

"Once materials are removed and the site rehabilitated in accordance with Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) requirements, the long-term use of the lands would revert back to being dedicated for development as 'employment' lands," Russell said in his report.

The expansion is proposed as a 'Class A - Above

Province Protecting Ontario Jobs with New Advertising Directive

July 3/24 - TORONTO — As part of the government's work to promote Ontario-made products, services businesses and workers, the Minister of Finance, the Minister of Transportation and the Minister of Tourism, Culture and Gaming have directed the largest four government agencies to allocate a minimum of 25 per cent of their annual advertising spending for Ontario publishers. These agencies are the Liquor Control Board of Ontario (LCBO), the Ontario Cannabis Store, Metrolinx and the Ontario Lottery and Gaming Corporation (OLG).

These government agencies are some of the largest advertisers in the province, together spending well over \$100 million on marketing each year. By



Water Table' pit under the Aggregate Resources Act (ARA) with a maximum annual tonnage limit of 400,000 tonnes.

The annual tonnage limit is proposed to match, and be combined with, the current McColgan Pit limit, so there is expected to be no increase in truck traffic.

The company is working with the MNRF to begin the ARA licensing process. Through the licensing process, the township says it is recognized as a commenting agency and staff will prepare separate technical comments for MNRF review once circulated.

According to the applicant's representative, James Hunter of Innovative Planning Solutions, there is no timeline for the existing pit. The licence has been in place since 1984 and the expansion could be a five- to 20-year plan.

"As operations occur, the plan is to rehab those lands to return them to employment uses," Hunter said at a public meeting to discuss the proposal on April 10.

The after-use plan encompasses both the existing pit land and the expansion land.

The conceptual after-use plan includes 22 industrial lots with a minimum lot size of 0.40 hectares (one acre) and access to full municipal services.

"While the plan is still conceptual at this stage, the proposal would increase the township's total serviced industrial land base considerably," Russell wrote.

The proposal received one comment from the public. "On a positive note, I am pleased to see a high-quality aggregate producing pit in the Township of Springwater, close to end users while strategically positioned in an industrial area of the township," wrote the resident of 28 Boothby Cres., whose name

To facilitate the expansion and continued extraction of aggregate resources from the McColgan Pit, Springwater staff recommended the report be received and council adopt the Official Plan amendment and that the amendment be submitted to the County of Simcoe for final approval, subject to minor modifications.

Additionally, staff recommended the implementing zoning bylaw be submitted to council for adoption, subject to the approval of the Official Plan amendment by the County of Simcoe.

The agencies have been directed to have this policy in place by September 3, 2024.



CAN I HAVE MY ROSES

AND **POLLINATORS** *TOO?*

Recently I joined both the Huronia and Canadian Rose Societies - and immediately felt guilty for doing

With the planet in such peril, with what we know about climate change, and the impact invasive species are having on our planet; with the steep decline in bird, insect, amphibian, reptile, and fish populations, who am I to indulge in something as trivial as growing roses?

Am I a selfish monster who hates humanity? (Spoiler Alert: No I am not.)

Gardening has changed over the centuries. Throughout history, pleasure gardens were reserved for the wealthy elites whereas, for the majority of the population, gardening was about providing food and medication for the family and community.

What we planted, why we planted, and how we tended those plants has certainly changed over time. We are mindful of the link between the planet's well-being and our own. We have come full-circle from our ancestors and are gardening for survival.

A 2020 report in the journal Science states that 3 billion birds have disappeared in North America since 1970. Professor Jeremy Kerr of the University of Ottawa says that most insect declines observed in Canada occur "at the intersection of habitat loss and climate change." One of the primary factors causing bumblebee decline in Canada, according to conservation scientist, Sheila Colla of York University, is climate change.

And gardeners have rallied to the cause. We are using fewer chemicals. (No more "Better Living Through Chemistry."). We are avoiding invasive species, and adding more native plants to our gardens.

And yet some gardeners feel the push and pull of conflicting needs. The new gardening ethos seems to be "plant for purpose, rather than beauty" which begs the question: can we be part of the solution to the planet's many environmental woes, and also grow flowers simply for the joy their beauty gives us?

Well, as it happens, yes we can.

Doug Tallamy is the TA Baker Professor of Entomology and Wildlife Ecology at the University of Delaware. Tallamy is also the go-to academic when it comes to understanding the importance





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of insects and learning what we gardeners can do to help ensure they survive and thrive. His latest book, Nature's Best Hope, "shows how homeowners everywhere can turn their yards into conservation corridors that provide wildlife habitats."

Tallamy slots plants into one of three categories: Contributors, Non-Contributors, and Detractors.

Tallamy urges gardeners to keep two guiding principles in mind.

The first is to try and attain a ratio in the garden of 70:30. In other words, let's strive to have 70% native Contributor plants and 30% Non-Contributor plants.

Detractor plants, ie, invasive species, should never be planted under any circumstances. Once established, invasive species disrupt our delicate ecosystems, do not support essential insect populations, and are extremely difficult to eliminate. (The Ontario Invasive Plants Council website is an excellent resource to learn more about these problematic plants.)

Tallamy's second principle uses the metaphor of the Keystone as a guide to selecting beneficial plants. In architecture, a Keystone is an element that, if removed, will cause an entire structure to collapse. In nature, Keystone plants are the workhorses that, if removed, will cause ecosystems to collapse. If native plants are good, Keystone plants are the multitasking natives that do much of the heavy lifting in our gardens. Let's look at just two of Tallamy's favourites.

It has often been said that if you're going to plant just one tree, make it an oak. Dr. Tallamy agrees and made a strong case in his 2021 book "The Nature of Oaks". Native oak species Quercus alba (white oak) and Quercus velutina (black oak) support a wide variety of wildlife, including an incredible 450 species of caterpillar.

Goldenrod

The second Keystone plant could use a PR boost: Solidago, aka "Goldenrod". Often confused with allergy-triggering ragweed, native Solidago species are ubiquitous in the late summer garden, bringing joyful colour while providing essential support to 120 caterpillar species and 22 species of bees. Species of note include Canada goldenrod (Solidago canadensis), Gray goldenrod (Solidago nemoralis), and Giant goldenrod (Solidago gigantea).

A common misconception is that pollinator-friendly gardens are less beautiful; a "symphony of brown" as one garden writer recently said. The fact is your garden can be comprised of 100% native plants and be a thing of beauty. We do not sacrifice beauty when we garden with native plants.

"But what about my roses?" Garden roses fall into Tallamy's Non-Contributer category, offering little or no support to wildlife. However, garden roses can support five species of native bees. Other popular Non-Contributer category garden plants that benefit native bees: Salvia support five bee species, Sunflowers support eight bee species, Lavender supports four bee species.

CONSIDER THIS: all of us must be thoughtful and ecologically-minded when choosing plants for our gardens. We can provide essential habitats for insects, birds and other pollinators, and enjoy the beautiful plants that bring such joy to our lives. If we remember Doug Tallamy's 70:30 ratio we can have our roses, and pollinators too.



The weather was hot and muggy, with clear skies and not a cloud in sight. I had expected to be devoured by mosquitoes up north, but was pleasantly surprised by how little there were once I doused myself in DEET. I have always wondered why bug spray keeps the bugs away but isn't

why bug spray keeps the bugs away but isn't harmful for us people, but decided that perhaps that was a question I didn't want the answer to. I had ventured an easy hour's drive north to Killbear Provincial Park, a small park that offers big scenery.

This park is not just for camping, but provides some great hiking trails, from the very short 0.8 km Lighthouse Trail to the longer Blind Bay trail that covers 5.47 km of moderate trekking along sandy beaches and granite shores. For those looking for an easy route, the recreation trail is a flat route that travels next to the main road and is favored in the winter for cross country skiing. Another popular trail is the Harold Point trail that passes by an iconic tree that is considered the most photographed tree in Ontario, a white pine that has been sculpted by the relentless winds. I headed out to the approximately 4 km Lookout Point loop trail for the view over the rocky shoreline of Georgian Bay. The trail begins through a wetland crossed by a well maintained boardwalk, which is even with the murky water at a few small sections. Small green frogs jump from water plants and iridescent dragonflies zip through the reeds while the air is heavy with moisture. Soon the boardwalk moves out of the marsh and enters a mixed forest of beech, maple and oak, with an abundance of colorful mushrooms poking out from rotted logs and leaf detritus.

The boardwalk disappears and trail becomes more rugged, though still suitable for most hikers. The elevation change is a manageable 60 meters as the trail winds its way uphill over rocky Canadian Shield and







exposed roots, until the forest disappears and is replaced by junipers and high bush blue berries ready for picking. Of course, bears also love those little berries, so it's best to be alert for any nearby rustling. There is cooling breeze out here on the small peninsula overlooking the blue waters of Georgian Bay and the rugged coastline. This is a great spot to cool off and enjoy a moment of quiet before continuing back on the slightly more challenging north portion of trail.

There are those times when being in nature causes your breath to catch and marvel at the beauty around us. I was within twenty feet of the parking lot when I noted a moving patch of color just off the boardwalk that resolved itself into the small and graceful form of a young deer. I spoke gentle murmurs and was amazed as she moved steadily towards me, stepping out onto the boardwalk less than five feet away before slowly moving back into the bush with the occasional stop to nibble on maple leaves. It was one of those moments that stay with you for a life time.

INGREDIENTS

Peach Ginger Mint Pops

- 8 ripe peaches, peeled and pitted
- 3 Tablespoons (45 ml) honey or maple syrup
- 3 Tablespoons (45ml) ginger puree or 1 Tablespoon (15 ml) ground ginger
- 2 Tablespoons (30 ml) fresh mint leaves, chopped or 1 -2 Tablespoons (15 -30 ml) mint sauce
- 3 Tablespoons (45 ml) fresh lemon juice **INSTRUCTIONS**

Peach Ginger Mint Pops

- 1. Combine the peaches and honey or maple syrup in a blender or food processor.
- 2. Pour the pureed peaches into a large saucepan and add the ginger, mint and lemon juice. Bring to a boil, stirring frequently for 1-2 minutes. Remove from the heat and allow to cool for at least 1 hour.
- 3. Strain the mixture through a sieve to remove the peach pulp, if desired.
- 4. Pour into popsicle molds or ice cube trays. Divide evenly and leave a 1/4 inch (0.64 cm) of space at the top. Cover the molds and insert the popsicle sticks, if using the popsicle molds or toothpicks, if using ice cube trays instead.
- 5. Freeze for at least 5 hours before serving.
- 6. To easily release the popsicles, first let the molds or ice cube trays sit at room temperature for 3-5 minutes or run under hot water for a few seconds on

the outside of the molds. **INGREDIENTS**

Mocha Ice Pops

- 1/2 cup (125 ml) unsweetened cocoa powder
- 3-4 Tablespoons (45-60 ml) honey or maple syrup, to taste

- ½ teaspoon (2.5 ml) ground cinnamon
- ¼ teaspoon (1.25 ml) ground nutmeg
- ¼ teaspoon (1.25 ml) salt
- 1½ cups (375 ml) milk, dairy or plant-based
- ½ cup (125 ml) 35% MF (milk fat) cream or full fat
- 1 cup (250 ml) strong brewed coffee, cooled
- 1 ½ (7.5 ml) teaspoons vanilla extract

INSTRUCTIONS

Mocha Ice Pops

- 1. In a large saucepan over medium heat, whisk together the cocoa powder, honey or maple syrup, cinnamon, nutmeg and salt until well combined.
- 2. Pour in the milk, cream or coconut milk and coffee and continue to whisk until the mixture thickens for several minutes. It should coat the back of a wooden spoon.
- 3. Remove from the heat and stir in the vanilla extract.
- 4. Allow to cool for at least 1 hour.
- 5. Pour the mixture into popsicle molds or ice cube trays. Divide evenly and leave a 1/4 inch (0.64 cm) of space at the top. Cover the molds and insert the popsicle sticks, if using the popsicle molds or toothpicks, if using ice cube trays instead.

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

Last Wednesday when the remnants of Hurricane Beryl came through, over 2 inches of rain was recorded here in Anten Mills. Fortunately the weather has not resulted in any local fire restrictions which is nice.

On Saturday morning a group of great volunteers gathered at the community centre to help do the monthly cleanup at the Anniversary Garden. Only three short years ago with the great donations of the community, the garden was planted. It has grown phenomenally with lots of plants for our pollinators. In a past edition it was noted that the township was going to paint lines on the multipurpose pad for pickleball. A man sits, blank eyes staring at a wall. He is unaware of the people who love him, or who brought him to this place. His mind is confused, perhaps wondering over and over again: "Where am I?" "What happened?" "Who am I?"

My husband suffered a mini-stroke during surgery on his carotid artery eleven years ago. I noticed over time that he was slowly declining in his thinking, talking and walking. One morning, I found him on the floor; he had fallen. I called 911 for the ambulance who transferred him to the local hospital where he stayed for almost three months. Over time, my husband lost the ability to walk and talk and he ended up in a wheelchair which made it impossible for me to take proper care of him. It has been two years now that my husband was admitted into a Long Term Care Facility with a diagnosis of Vascular Dementia.

I have been going in to visit my husband and to help feed his dinner as he is unable to feed himself. It is hard to leave my husband after my visits, as he does not know where he is, or why he is in this place or who I am at times. Yet, it is becoming easier for me to not visit every day because I know that he is being cared for physically, spiritually and mentally by the Nurses, Personal Support Workers and Staff at the Long Term Care Home.

As I sit and ponder his and my situation, I am reminded that my husband was not alone, as we are never alone. God was with him even though his mind could not understand. God was with him, as He is with us, through doctors, guiding their hands and minds. God was with him, as He is with us, through caring hands of nurses and technicians. God is with us, through a letter, a smile, a hug, a compassionate word, and a small kind deed.

Prayer: Dear God, You are with us as You guide the people who help us. You are with us through family and friends, through loving deeds, letters, and words of comfort. Thank You, God, for being with us in whatever circumstance we are faced with. Amen.

Halters are fancy collars that sit nicely around the calves' head. We tied them up with a nice long rope outside the barn and they can munch grass all day until we get a pro fence put up.

So, our little homestead is growing little by little. Chickens, ducks, cows and rumor has it that two piglets will make an appearance in a couple weeks. Possible names are Bacon and Porkchop but we'll see if that passes approval from the naming committee. Time flies, dad! Make every moment count! Even the rookie ones.

HURONIA WEST OPP LOCATE STOLEN VEHICLE AND CHARGE ONE INDIVIDUAL WITH MULTIPLE OFFENCES

(July 15, 2024 - TOWN OF WASAGA BEACH, ON) - Members of the Huronia West Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) have charged one individual with multiple offences stemming from a report of a stolen motor vehicle in Port Severn.

However, the vehicle failed to stop, instead striking a fence and jumping a ditch before proceeding in the direction of Wasaga Beach. A short time later, the vehicle was located on Shore Lane in Wasaga Beach, and the lone driver fled by foot. After a brief foot pursuit, the individual was arrested without incident.

During the search incident to arrest, 56.4 grams of fentanyl was located and seized.

As a result, James HARDER, a 36-year-old of Kitchener, was arrested and charged with:

- Possession Property obtained by Crime Over \$5000
- Flight from Peace Officer
- Dangerous Operation
- Fail to Comply with Probation Order two counts
- Theft Under \$5000
- Possession of Schedule I substance for the purpose of Trafficking-Opioid

The accused is scheduled to attend the Ontario Court of Justice in Collingwood on August 13, 2024, to answer to the charges.

Calls for Service and Joint Marine Patrols with Parks Canada Officers Over the Weekend for OPP Marine Unit

(MIDLAND, On)- Over the July 10- 14, 2024 time frame, marine officers from the Southern Georgian Bay Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) responded to 8 calls for service from the public made to the OPP Communications Center while conducting joint marine patrols with Parks Canada staff from Georgian Bay Islands National Park.

Officers responded to calls for service such as vessels reported adrift, drinking boaters, overdue boaters, assisting Transport Canada with marine buoy placement and a 911 call near Cedar Springs campground. Also, a presentation on marine investigations and safety programs was made to the Honey Harbour Cottage Association on July 13, 2024. There was also a opportunity for members to ask questions of the officers and speak about their complaints of speeding vessels and excessive noise emitted by some vessels to name a few in the Honey Harbour area.

Officers logged 33 hours of patrol time, checking 18 vessels for required equipment and signs of operator impairment resulting in 6 operators being educated in various marine related violations that were minor

VESSELINFRACTION INVESTIGATIONS

On July 14, 2024 a 44 year old male resident of the United States was cited for Operating Vessel to Tow a Person on Water or in Air Without a Person on Board Other Than The Operator Keeping Watch on Every Person Being Towed while operating a vessel on Gloucester Pool, Severn Township, on the same day, a 48 year old male of Woodbridge operating a vessel in Frying Pan Bay was cited for Operating human-powered pleasure craft without personal flotation device or lifejacket of appropriate size for each person on board contrary to the Canada

Shipping Act.

Late in the afternoon of July 13, 2024 a vessel was observed by officers at speed within 30 meters of shore while southbound on the west side of Royal Island, Georgian Bay Township. The vessel was stopped and after investigation the operator- a 71 year old Tay Township male was cited for operating a vessel failing to have a functioning muffler system, not having proof of competency aboard and operating power-driven or electrically propelled vessel over maximum speed specified. WEEKEND PLAGUED WITH GRAFFITI ENDS IN ARRESTS

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
