Locally, I met the Collingwood Ambassador and had the chance to room with the ambassador from Aurther. It was great to be with the entire group; although I can say I was probably one of the youngest. I learned so much from my peers and mentors.

Throughout the event, we had a chance to tour the farm exhibition which was interesting to see. It showed how many animals there are on a farm, which must have been exciting for the youth in attendance who may never have seen them live and up close. Maybe it will encourage more to come to our

livestock shows! Later the first night we attended a seminar on normalizing differences and interacting with the world around us. This really talked about how each one of us is human and equal but each person does have their differences. The days were long, waking up at 6:00 am and going to bed around 10:30 pm but it was all part of a generous experience! I had the opportunity to watch The Warriors Day Parade on opening day. It was so interesting to see all the different groups that fight for our country in one parade, a special moment as it went through the Princess Gates.

We also were in a mental health seminar mainly focusing on the mental health of farmers.

The challenges that farmers face when seeking care and new opportunities for assistance were talked about.

There was a self-defence seminar learning how to protect yourself from potential threats. So try not to scare me on the streets of town when you see me, I have some new moves. We had a great formal dinner Saturday night!

Afterwards, we attended an etiquette seminar focusing on posture, answering impromptu questions, how to warm up before a speech physically and just how to get rid of those nerves before speaking. This seminar came from a former CNE ambassador Charlene Carroll. On the final day, it was the competition and we started out with our semi-finals at the Queen Elizabeth Theater giving our oneminute speech. Everyone did such an amazing job with their presentations and it was definitely a hard choice for the judges. After that, we were able to have lunch on the grounds and explore the food building. I ate a taco grilled cheese sandwich and a creme brulee croissant cone. All I can say is it was the best meal ever!

After lunch, we rode the train and were ready for the finals giving our quick elevator pitch. The Congeniality Award was given this year to the Ambassador from Six Nations, she is an Auntie in her community and certainly a kind, easy-toapproach Auntie with all of the delegates.

The top seven Ambassadors (Sunderland, Erin, Ripley, Dundalk, Stratford, Milverton, Petrolia) were chosen Sunday afternoon, from there the top three (Sunderland, Stratford and Ripley) with the announcement that the 2024-2025 CNE Ambassador this year was from Ripley - Hannah MacDonald. She was so shocked.

Overall this was an incredible experience and one that I will truly remember for the rest of my life. I met and reconnected with my fellow ambassadors there who were kind, and supportive to one another and we spent time together just touring the fair which was so fun. The CNE's generosity was so immense and I will forever be thankful for providing our meals, a goodie bag and the Hotel stay. I learned a lot from my time there. I left the program a better communicator, my eyes opened to new experiences, a general enhancement of my communication skills and a greater appreciation for the things that


All 4 teams played a round robin with Hamilton and Great West finishing with 4 points, Dufferin Simcoe 3 points and Spring Lake 1 point.



This includes, but is not limited to, boathouses, retaining walls, patios, landscaping, decks, fences, walls, or shoreline alteration that are in proximity to the 178-metre contour elevation of the Georgian Bay Shoreline. Wed Sept 11, 2024: Wills and Power of Attorney

Estate planning is easy to put aside; we prefer to not think about our mortality. However, it's one of the most important things we can do for ourselves and the people we care about. Wills and powers of attorney (POA) make up the cornerstone documents in an estate plan. A POA is meant to protect us while we're alive and a will is to honor one's wishes after they pass.

As part of this workshop, experts will cover strategies on taking control of your legal and financial well-being and protecting your loved ones. They will also discuss the importance of appointing trusted individuals to act on your behalf as well as the different types of Powers of Attorney.

The discussion will be led by a member of Durham Regional Police Service's Older Adult Support and Investigative Services (OASIS).



August 26, 2024 - Hello Everyone. Last issue, I quoted from Max Lucado's 2007 devotional called Grace for the Moment. In his introduction, he wrote: "Because of Calvary, I'm free to choose. And so, I choose." He went on to tell us how each

morning he spends time choosing to live the practical application of love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control as he meets the challenges of the day ahead of him. In Galatians 5:22-23, the Apostle Paul called these nine character choices "the fruit of the Spirit". He finished writing verse 23 with these words: "Against such there is no law."

We are not alone during the challenges we face. The Bible reminds us that God will never leave us nor forsake us. We can choose to be grateful for His presence in our lives, or we can send Him away.

What we choose today impacts what tomorrow, and the days after that, will be like. Let's choose carefully. Amen.

Madeline Tannahill from Penetang sits back and reminisces about those days when she excelled in the sport of golf.

It all started in 1966 at the Ashburn Country Club in Halifax where she qualified for the tournament by being among the top 16 players in Ontario.

From 1968 to 1979, she competed in Ontario Open Tournament with fields of 90 golfers with her best finish coming in fifth.

Maddy played in many Canadian Ladies golf championships beginning in 1970 at the Oakdale Country Club in Toronto with a five handicap and then in 1974 in Winnipeg. She competed in Ontario Match Play four times.

For a person to qualify for Ontario Match Play, a player had to be in the low 16 in the Ontario Open. In order to do that she had to win a berth on the Huronia District team which in turn dictated four match play playdowns.

Maddy was in the top eight Ontario amateur ladies from 1974 to 1977 which allowed her to be a member of the Ontario Match team.

Maddy captured the Huronia District championship eight times from 1968 to1979 playing two matches a day over a two day period, beating the best golfers from Shanty Bay, Barrie, Midland, Orillia, Collingwood, Brooklea and Horseshoe Valley golf clubs.

It was quite a year for the Tannahills in 1968, Maddy is Don's twin sister and it was the same year

he won the Memorial Cup in hockey.

The same year she won the Midland Golf and Country Club ladies championship and then did it a total of 10 times.

During the 1980 tournament Maddy had recorded 75 on both her first rounds, going into the second day she had a 20 stroke lead over second place.

Madeline held a Canadian Professional Golfers Association Certificate as a teaching pro...what a player.

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

After last weeks adventure along that escarpment face, I chose a close to the ground route with no stomach-turning drops, only picturesque views. Hardy Lake Provincial Park is found on Highway 169 just east of Bala. It is a popular destination and parking is limited, but if you are inventive and don't mind some scratched paint you may be able to just squeeze yourself into a spot that is perhaps not really a parking spot and might be up the side of the bank with your car on a significant slant. All par for the adventure!

Hardy Lake has some unique flora that is usually found on the Atlantic Coast. If you like geology you would already know that this is due to the glaciers and that this area was once Lake Algonquin. This is typical Canadian Shield, with lots of bogs and marshes as well mixed forests. There are several trails to choose from, like the short three km B and C trails that are perfect for those with children, and still offer beautiful views out and over the lake and through forests of pine and cedar. I chose the longer A trail, which is a doable nine km. There is also an extra one km trail that adds to the A trail. Trails are easy to follow, and any side trails are clearly marked. The trail itself has some small elevation changes, lots of roots, and many areas of thick black mud. I doubt that the trail is ever completely dry and would suggest wearing shoes that you don't mind squelching through. There are also several boardwalks that connect you between points of land and offer scenic views over Hardy Lake.

Despite the overcrowded parking lot, those crowds disappeared once I was out on the trail, only briefly passing other hikers, or having them pass me as I contorted myself into pretzels trying to get the right angle to identify a new fungus. Today I was intrigued by what looked like a brown sea urchin hiding under a rotten log. A quick poke, and nope, instead of spines these spikes were soft and squishy. There is my lack of self preservation again, poking my finger where it doesn't belong. A quick scan of my app and there it was, chocolate tube slime, and not even a true fungus but a protista, and nope, I have no idea what that means except slimy, and I have no intention of licking it to see if it really does



taste like chocolate.

About halfway through the trail there is the remains of an old homestead. Only the small grey walls and chimney remain, though I did stumble over a metal pipe leading to the lake, perhaps for pumping water. It would have been a beautiful spot to live, though very rugged and isolating. I can relate, as some days I would love to have a break from society. Finally, within the last km or two the mixed forest becomes dense pine with

a thick brown litter of needles. A small creek travels down a granite slope with burbles and gurgles. A lovely place to sit for a minute for a rest. Altogether a great trail for any ability. And now dear readers, I have a plane leaving in just a few hours and have yet to pack, because I always leave things for the last minute, and there seems to be a large orange tabby sleeping in my luggage. It's off to the Emerald Isle!!

THAI COLD SOUP A NEW TAKE ON **GAZPACHO**

INGREDIENTS

• 2 cups (500 ml) fresh, finely diced tomatoes of choice

• 1 cup (250 ml) fresh, finely diced cucumbers of choice

- 1 yellow or red pepper, finely diced
- 1 shallot, fined diced



- 1 cup (250 ml) coconut milk
- 2 Tablespoons (30 ml) fish sauce

• 2 Tablespoons (30 ml) lemon grass paste or 2 stalks lemon grass, minced

• 1 Tablespoon (15 ml) freshly grated ginger or ginger paste or ¼ teaspoon (1.25 ml) ground ginger spice

- 1 Tablespoon (15 ml) palm, coconut or brown sugar
- ¹/₄ cup (63 ml) freshly squeezed lime juice

• 2 garlic cloves, crushed or 1 teaspoon (5 ml) garlic paste or ¹/₂ teaspoon (2.5 ml) garlic powder

• 1-2 teaspoons (5-10 ml) chili paste, sriracha, hot sauce or crushed red pepper flakes, optional

· Garnish Options: cooked shrimp, sliced green onions, fresh basil, chopped peanuts or cashews

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Combine the coconut milk, fish sauce, lemon grass, ginger, and sugar in a saucepan. Cook on medium heat, stirring frequently for 5-10 minutes. Remove from the heat and let the mixture cool to room temperature.

2. To a large bowl, add the tomatoes, cucumbers,

yellow or red pepper, shallot, lime juice, garlic and chili paste, sriracha, hot sauce or crushed red pepper flakes. If a smoother texture is preferred, combine these ingredients in a food processor and pulse several times until the desired consistency is achieved.

3. Add the ingredients from the saucepan to the tomato mixture and chill in the refrigerator for at least 2 hours until very cold.

4. When ready to serve, divide the soup into individual bowls and garnish with desired toppings such as cooked shrimp, sliced green onions, fresh basil, chopped peanuts or cashews.


Accompanying this article you will see a photo that may look a bit strange. Anten Mills 150 and 2025 - 1875. Just what does that mean? Obviously the building on the left is our current community centre and the former Anten Mills school house. The building on the right is believed to be the original school house. According to the book, "A History of Vespra Township ", in 1875 Anten Mills became a community with the construction of a school. It is believed that the school could accommodate up to 90 students. The original school was replaced by our current community centre in 1891 and the first students went to school there in 1892. As the village was part of the former Township of Vespra, the community was never incorporated but we know it as our community and next year we will celebrate 150 years.

In 2021 following a detailed assessment by the township Heritage Committee, the building was deemed to be of heritage significance and was designated a Heritage Building by Springwater Township and listed accordingly. Some of the assets which were seen are the school bell and tower, original trim throughout the building as well as random width tongue and groove wainscoting on the walls and ceiling.

In recognition of the 150th anniversary, the Anten Mills Community Recreation Association has requested that the bell and tower be restored to working condition, the drop ceiling be removed and the original tongue and groove ceiling be restored with period appropriate lighting and that the floors be replaced with a luxury vinyl, plank flooring replicating the hardwood below. It is understood that this request will be discussed at the next council meeting on September 4. The support of the community is needed and you are asked to reach out to your council member to encourage them to include the request as they work on the 2025 municipal budget. 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Pittman 'actively working' to reopen OPP satellite in Penetang

Aug 19, 2024 - A visit by the OPP to Penetanguishene council provided an insight into the community safety and policing act, crime statistics, and an active effort to re-open the Penetanguishene walk-in office.

Southern Georgian Bay OPP detachment commander Inspector Todd Pittman provided a verbal presentation regarding the Community Safety and Policing Act consultation at the recent regular council meeting.

The intent was to highlight three key priorities on the existing detachment action plan and ask for comments, regarding: crime prevention; policing roadways, waterways and trails; and community well-being

"The first key priority that we have is on addressing and preventing crime in our policing area while maintaining investigative excellence," said Pittman.

"Really, that's about building those relationships with our victim services, looking at targeting intimate partner violence."

He noted that two positions were implemented but not yet filled to combat the epidemic of intimate partner violence.

Through various working partnerships ranging from Crown attorneys, local shelters, youth wellness hubs and more, Pittman described the various means which the OPP engaged with the community. Additionally, the community street crimes unit engaged in drug crimes as well as property crimes.

"If I'm not mistaken, there was a warrant executed (recently) in the town of Penetanguishene resulting in a recovered stolen BMW that we now have in our hands, being processed by our forensic identification team," said Pittman.

Pittman added that the mental health response team would be rebranded as MCCRT (Mobile Crisis Rapid Response Team), with his aim to increase the number officers from one to two due to the "quite high" mental health occurrences in Penetanguishene compared to other communities.

The second priority listed by Pittman involved roadways, waterways, trails, and the year-round focus on policing those.

He reminded council that the Southern Georgian Bay OPP was "one of the fortunate detachments with a fulltime marine unit", and that he could be looking at the detachment obtaining all-terrain vehicles for increased patrol for communities with related bylaws.

"We'll continue to do our RIDE initiatives, focus patrols on high-traffic complaint areas," Pittman added. "We do directed foot patrols as well, just on areas where we have increased drug use and things like that."

The third key priority was on community well being, and partnerships within the detachment stakeholder communities. "That's engaging these in being a part of the committees," Pittman said, "the discussion, and really looking for a whole-of-community approach to community well being is a big focus for us.

"It's important, I think, to hear from our business what's happening in our streets, what they're seeing, and to get the pulse of the community."

With the core presentation addressed, Pittman included a brief summary of crime statistics he had on hand for Penetanguishene.

Motor vehicle collisions of personal injuries, fatalities, and property damage, were down 29.5 per cent from 2022 to date; speeding charges in Penetanguishene were up 86.2 per cent; seatbelt charges were up 200 per cent; and Pittman stated that he was happy to see that impaired charges were down 31.6 per cent.

Violent crimes included one homicide in 2023, with other serious violent crime of attempted murder, sexual assault, assault, firearms offenses, and robberies down 47 per cent from 2022 to date, "which is a very good thing".

"Our property crimes – so that's arsons, break and enters, theft over, theft under \$5,000 as a threshold, possession of stolen goods – even though we just did recover a BMW yesterday, we are still down 32.5 per cent which is a good thing," said Pittman.

"It's not the enforcement, it's the amount of calls for service and issues for those things are going down, which is great for our overall community safety and well being."

Drug crime saw a 20 per cent overall decrease, while clearance rates were at 63.9 per cent overall. Property crimes, "often the most difficult one to solve", said Pittman, were below the provincial average sitting at 17 per cent.

"We brought in last year, and we're still pushing it, trying to get things like the CamSAFE initiative, trying to get people comfortable with coming and reporting these crimes to police and identifying the people responsible."

Some friends texted us a few weeks ago. They had some unexpected piglets show up from one of their pigs. Did we want any piglets? DID WE?!? My patient wife and I loaded seven of our kids in the big van for a three-hour tour to collect the little squealers. But how do you transport piglets for three hours? I'm glad you asked. If you're smart you have some sort of enclosed cage-like structure. Maybe a dog kennel or a livestock trailer or something professional like that. Regarding mental health calls, 112 were reported in 2023 while 2022 saw 95; Pittman offered that the todate number of 78 currently meant that "we're probably going to be up around that 100-plus mark again this year, just showing that mental health is on the rise in our communities and we need a response."

Coun. Doug Leroux shared that speeding was the biggest complaint in the town from what residents had told him, and Pittman acknowledged that traffic complaints were "the number one complaint in the entire province." His plan was to dedicate more officers to speed enforcement.

Addressing a previous comment by Coun. George Vadeboncoeur about deployed resources in the future, Pittman explained that he had since consulted regarding a staffing deployment model as the way to gain future staff. He specifically noted the Penetanguishene OPP satellite office which had closed its doors in 2022.

"We ended up closing the office when we lost one of our detachment administrative clerks, because then we had nobody to work the front desk. We still do have officers going in and utilizing the office, however," said Pittman.

Of interest right now, we're actually getting more staff," Pittman added. "We had three new staff start this week, and we're getting another five by February, so we're actually overstaffed a little bit in the office.

"One of the overstaffs that I would like, and I'm actively working on, is another detachment administrative clerk. If I can get that clerk, then we will reopen the Penetanguishene office for walk-in service from the detachment, and that's something I'm working on."

Meetings of Penetanguishene council are held on the second Wednesday of each month, and can be watched live on Rogers TV cable 53 when available, or on the Rogers TV website.

Here's what North Simcoe residents pay for when councils go to AMO

Aug 19, 2024 - What better way to celebrate the 125th anniversary of the Association of Municipalities of Ontario, than to have taxpayer dollars advocate for pressing issues in their respective communities?

The annual conference begins next week in Ottawa, and many of the 444 represented municipalities have been preparing to attend with delegations in mind.

As each would need to submit a request for an opportunity to have a 10-minute, one-on-one with provincial politicians, choosing which topic to speak about and with whom would be unique for every municipality to agree upon within their own ranks.

MidlandToday reached out to North Simcoe's municipalities to see what they would be seeking to accomplish at the conference, how much it would cost their ratepayers, and why it was an important function which would benefit their residents.

MIDLAND

Of seven requested delegations, CAO Rhonda Bunn stated that five had received confirmation.

Those were in regards to: a \$42-million grant application to the Housing-Enabling Water System Fund (Ministry of Infrastructure); support for the cruise industry (Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Gaming); the Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund and a change to Municipal Accommodation Tax legislation (both with the Ministry of Finance); and a shortage of qualified building inspectors within the province (Ministry of Colleges and Universities).

"Delegations hosted at AMO are an excellent opportunity for municipal staff and elected officials to meet face-to-face with provincial leaders and ministry staff," said Bunn, adding that the delegation requests "highlight some of the challenges faced by small urban municipalities such as ours."

Costwise, Bunn cited that Mayor Bill Gordon would be attending as a Simcoe County council member under their fee expense (which means taxpayers would be paying for his stay through the county rather than municipality), while the remaining six council members and two senior staff members also scheduled the full conference to attend; early bird registration and three nights of conference hotel accommodations for roughly \$1,700 per person calculated to \$13,600 total.

"The town takes advantage of 'early bird' rates by registering early in the year to keep our costs low," Bunn shared.

Gordon said that out of all the conference opportunities available to municipal leaders and senior staff each year, if you only had the budget or desire to attend one, it would be the AMO.

"The costs are trivial when compared to the value received by networking with virtually every peer municipality in the Province over three days," he will be going to learning sessions... networking with said.

provides valuable direction for the following years. It is also the forum to elect new members to the AMO board and opportunities to connect directly with every Provincial minister and their staff," stated Gordon who, as per a recent council meeting, had received unanimous approval from Midland council to run for a position on the AMO board of directors.

"We are lucky to have such a close relationship with our MPP/Minister Dunlop in Simcoe North but that doesn't replace the need to network and connect with other ministers at the conference," Gordon added.

Regarding the Ministry of Infrastructure delegation, Gordon hoped that residents would wish him luck.

"I am up against 443 other municipalities," said Gordon, "but we have a solid business case and an excellent presentation lined up for each of the delegations, especially this one. I will be selling our town hard to the ministers we meet with and looking for the help we need to help us support growth. Our water/wastewater system expansion is staggeringly expensive, and without winning some significant Provincial funding the costs will be borne by the local ratepayers."

PENETANGUISHENE

Mayor Doug Rawson said that three delegations had been accepted for the week.

"We're meeting with the Solicitor General regarding the Central North Correctional Centre and the funding disparity between us and the province," said Rawson. "We're also meeting with the Minister of Finance regarding heads-and-beds regarding Waypoint and the superjail; first time we've delegated that in some time so we're looking forward to that. And we're meeting with the Ministry of Seniors and Accessibility regarding regulatory framework for long-term care institutions."

Value was the key reward, said Rawson on what Penetanguishene residents were paying for.

At an expense of approximately \$2,000 each for the full complement of seven council members and CAO, Rawson cited previous years where AMO delegations had produced results.

"Last year we delegated (Ojibwa Landing at 111 Robert Street West) at AMO, talking about how long it's been going through the approval process, and we're almost right across the finish line. Quickly after delegation last year, the ministers were able to put a little more pressure on the department level, we were able to get that across the line quicker. We've had some positive traction regarding CNCC; there's no check in the mail but this is about building partnerships and relationships, and bringing our agenda forward.

"On top of the delegation piece, there's also lots of learning," Rawson added. "Every member of council other municipalities. I think it's hard to measure, but it delivers tremendous value back to our council and our community at large." **TINY TOWNSHIP**

and the development of settlement areas.

"All residences, farms and businesses in Tiny are on a septic system," stated Leblond. "Given the vast size of the township (roughly 344 square kilometres), underground wastewater treatment infrastructure to connect homes is extremely expensive and not feasible to install."

Leblond noted that while septage could be spread on ministry-approved fields during winter, resident options were limited.


"Previously, septage from Tiny was able to be hauled to the Town of Midland's wastewater treatment centre, but this is no longer an option. The discussion with the Minister of Infrastructure will explore the septage challenges currently experienced by the township and others in North Simcoe, and the potential for provincial assistance in investment into alternatives to field applications."

As for development of settlement areas (through the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing), Leblond explained that the township had been advocating for changes and expansions for years, contending that the current fixed settlement boundaries by the county and the province were non-reflective of activity seen through increased building permit activity and a demand for housing and employment lands in Tiny.

"The township is supportive of proposed new policy directions in a consolidated provincial policy document that will provide more flexibility for settlement area boundaries," said Leblond. "Discussions with the Ministry will explore the expansion of the township settlement areas in smart and sustainable ways."

The importance of AMO attendance, according to Leblond, was due to the venue being the "largest annual gathering for local and provincial elected officials to meet, share ideas and solutions to common issues, and learn about emerging trends and upcoming changes that may impact our community".

"Registration and accommodation for Mayor Dave Evans and Deputy Mayor Sean Miskimins is covered by the County of Simcoe. The expense for the other members of council attending is registration of \$860 and hotel of \$909." As AMO was the primary advocate organization for municipalities, Leblond said it was imperative for the township to be part of the conversations.



More focused events and conferences provided similar value, said Gordon, but not to the widespread opportunity of AMO.

"Participation in these yearly events, even if only at the AMO, keeps a municipality connected to their associations and their executive, their peers and


