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CELEBRATE Springvater

Sep 15, 2024 - Thousands of folks from across Springwater Township descended on Midhurst's Tree Nursery Sport Park Saturday afternoon to celebrate the township's 30th birthday.

For hours, township residents - old and young enjoyed food, fun and frivolity while the summer's last blast of fantastic weather provided a pictureperfect backdrop. The closing fireworks provided the requisite exclamation mark. Gathered at picnic tables, spread out on blankets or huddled in groups, folks chatted with new and old friends alike while local musicians provided a soundtrack of live music.

"Tonight we celebrate Springwater, never forgetting who we were - or where we come from - yet embracing our future," said Springwater Township Mayor Jennifer Coughlin, host and emcee of the event. "As we celebrate Springwater's 30th anniversary, we are reminded of the community spirit that defines us. "Our communities aren't just dots on a map, little boxes on a grid - they are places where people gather, connect, and support each other," she added.

As township councillors served up ice cream and local Lions and Lionesses dished out barbecued goodies, the older party-goers took in displays from

Shortly after opening the gates to the free event, local talent search winners Erika DaCunha and Ethan McBrien kicked off the live music - an all-Springwater affair that included Graham Scott Fleming, a rising country performer who got his start in show business on Broadway and headliner Dayna Reid, who releases her debut album, She's Me, this coming Saturday, Sept. 21. "This is what makes Springwater special," Coughlin told the crowd as she introduced the evening's acts. "The reason we get to enjoy this talent tonight is not simply because they grew up here - it's because they choose here. "And they choose here because of you - their family, their friends, neighbours - their career-long supporters and the awkward fan-girls like me," Couglin added. As the bands played on, revelers had the chance to get up close and personal with first-responders from police, fire and emergency services and the vehicles they use.

Historic Beach Access and Usage Rights in the Township of Tiny

This letter is not promoting trespassing, which many have been led to believe they are guilty of. Using our beaches is not trespassing. It is our right. Please respect private property and also our beaches, by taking with you all that you brought. Including cigarette butts.

Tiny's beaches are famous the world over. Sadly, some have been attempting to keep them from us by claiming they are private.

Historic Beach Rights mean something and no one should be able to prevent us from exercising them freely. The fallacy that the beaches in Tiny are private has gone too far.

The decision by the Court of Appeal for Ontario, the highest court in the province, has been referenced in cases across the country.

Gibbs v. Grand Bend (Village), 1996 CanLII 2835 (ON CA)

"open and unobstructed use by the public for a substantial period of time is, as a rule, the evidence from which a trier of fact may infer both dedi-cation and acceptance. ... Once a dedica-tion is complete, neither the owners nor their successors-in-title could revoke it ... Neither the dedicator nor his successorin-title can resume control of or convey the land free from the public rights to its use, nor can anything be done by the present owners to take back that which had been previously given away."

Boundaries Act applications or quit claims deeds would have occurred after historic use was already a thing. Adverse possession; the suggestion that only 60 feet at the accesses are for public use; private property signs littering our beaches and pathways; "erroneous surveys"; ugly and dangerous groynes that are ruining our beautiful and natural "dynamic shorelines"; the abuse of good people; MUST STOP. The correct process should be followed like the Gibbs case. This is about fair trials and truth-seeking. The onus is on the claimant to prove that they own the land. And more importantly, that historic beach rights do not exist. How hard is it for the ones who claim the beach is private, to join together and raise the funds to take this to court like Gibbs, and try to prove it once and for all? Is money the issue? Isn't there a lawyer on board who will do it pro bono? Many have joined forces very recently to try to stop something else in Tiny, making it abundantly clear that the solidarity is there. So why hasn't this happened? Would it actually be that if it were able to be proven, it would have happened a long time ago? Until the privateers put their money where their mouths are, and prove these claims fairly and truthfully, the people should know their rights and they should be left alone to enjoy their commons areas. ... Joint Statement by Mayor Nuttall, Mayor Greenlaw, **Mayor Coughlin** & County Warden **Clarke: Update** on **Discussions Regarding the City** of Barrie's Boundary **Expansion Request**

Midhurst/September 13, 2024 - Today, the City of Barrie, the Township of Oro-Medonte, the Township of Springwater, and the County of Simcoe released the following statement:

"The City of Barrie, the Township of Oro-Medonte, the Township of Springwater, and the County of Simcoe ("the municipalities") continue to be engaged in facilitated discussions, with the intent of developing mutually acceptable approaches to address growth pressures in the broader region. These discussions are being supported by the Office of the Provincial Land and Development Facilitator (OPLDF), a provincial agency.

As a next step in the process, the parties have jointly retained Hemson Consulting to complete a Joint Lands Needs Analysis and Study. This study is intended to determine the need for additional employment and/or residential land within and around the City of Barrie, the Township of Oro-Medonte, and the Township of Springwater.

The study will be completed in a phased manner. The initial phase will include a review of the City of Barrie's existing land supply, coupled with a review of the needs of the participating municipalities arising from growth forecasted to 2051. The information gathered will serve as a foundation for further discussions on options moving forward when this phase of the study is completed, later this fall.

More details regarding the outcomes of the study, and continued discussions, will be shared as they become available. The City of Barrie, the Township of Oro-Medonte, the Township of Springwater, and the County of Simcoe remain committed to finding mutually beneficial solutions for managing growth that strengthen our respective communities and provide opportunities for all residents."

Craighurst W I August meeting



Prescription antibiotic ointments are available and can be prescribed by pharmacists. It is best to remove any crusts from the skin before applying the antibiotic ointment. Use a clean cloth soaked in warm soapy water and apply for 10-15 minutes then gently scrub off the crusts. After 2 days of antibiotic treatment, impetigo is no longer contagious.



Without budget survey, Tiny mayor plans'to take everything into consideration'

Sep 23, 2024 - The budget discussion for Tiny Township will be taking place over three days in early December, but without a 2025 budget survey Mayor Dave Evans wants residents to participate by phone, email and in-person.

An announcement was provided at the start of the recent regular meeting of council that the three days of budget discussions would take place on December 2, 3, and 4, starting at 5 p.m. in the municipal council chambers at 130 Balm Beach Road West. The 2024 budget was approved early in the year at a 5.03 per cent blended tax rate increase, and an 8.19 municipal tax rate increase. Evans spoke with MidlandToday after the meeting, sharing that he found budget talks to be "an interesting exercise". "I was reading a story about municipal taxes in Moncton, NB, today and they've gone up 18 per cent every year for the last three years, and they're going up in the future," said Evans. "Now I feel confident that we're not going to be an 18 per cent (municipality). "At the end of the day, that's what we're all about is money and getting the most money for our citizens." "The new facility will obviously be included in those discussions," Evans noted.

Built in 1967, the current municipal building was addressed in a 2014 needs assessment and 2016 clerk's report which concluded it was "inadequate for current

By: Derek Howard, Local Journalism Initiative and any future staff accommodations," prompting council of the day to explore options. When a 2022 asset management report identified an underfunding of municipal assets needing repair or replacement, the Tiny Township administration centre was pushed forward. The announcement of the building was met with protest by township residents against the raising of municipal taxes for the facility, organizing a 'Stop the Build' obstruction campaign, and countered by others in the community as 'divisive'.

In June, an updated asset management report noted that the "line drawn in the sand" to close the gap for tax-funded assets would require an annual 2.39 per cent tax rate increase. As well as the administration centre, Evans mentioned upgrades to the Midland wastewater treatment facility related to septage management within North Simcoe, as delegated during the recent Association of Municipalities of Ontario conference. "That's an agreement we're really excited about putting" together, between the town of Midland and township of Tiny, to come up with a solution for septage. And that may have capital implications; actually I could probably guarantee you it will," said Evans.

Due to numerous factors, Evans declined to speculate on inflation numbers but stated his interest, namely from a net year-over-year functionality perspective. "I think that people are going to find that some of the conventional wisdom is it's in the teens and the twenties; we're going to be below that," Evans said. "But I don't at this time know exactly where we'll be." When asked how residents would be able to participate in the budget process prior to the December discussions, Evans said that a budget survey wasn't able to be provided this year due to staffing issues. "With the shortage we had in our CAO department and such - our deputy CAO came from our treasury department who is the one that puts that together – unfortunately, we weren't able to do that this year," said Evans. "We do get a lot of feedback from the community, good and bad, and we'll look forward to that. As part of the budget process, people will be able to come in and participate, and make deputations just like they do here.'

As the entire management of the township goes under budgetary scrutiny through the three-day span, Evans described the budget meetings as "pretty voluminous, Regarding a potential and they have to be." overabundance of deputations, Evans admitted: "Right now, I don't know exactly what we'll have in place, but it will be limited. "But you can certainly call or email; that's unlimited, and we'll take everything into consideration." Further information on the 2025 budget discussions is expected to be available on the Tiny Township website within upcoming weeks.

Heads of council meeting yields little progress on user-fee study

Sep 23, 2024 - The unification of North Simcoe municipalities toward a user-fee study won't be happening any time soon, if Tiny Township council's response is any indication.

A joint letter circulated in July to the councils of Tiny Township, Midland, Penetanguishene and Tay Township had been discussed at various meetings over recent months, asking if the four councils would participate in a recreational amenities and services study for resident and non-resident user fees. Since that letter went out, Tay announced they would not participate while Midland and Penetanguishene would. The matter was discussed at the previous meeting of Tiny Township council who expressed interest but wanted to wait until an early-September meeting of the heads of council.

The recent committee of the whole meeting addressed that heads of council discussion, with Mayor Dave Evans stating that the matter had been discussed but there had been no change in Tiny's position, "in terms of us paying or providing compensation for recreational facilities in neighbouring communities." Evans reiterated that discussions should continue to be ongoing and that one "should never say never", but proposed that the July letter be received as information with no further action taken. Deputy Mayor Sean Miskimins, who also attended the meeting, agreed with Evans. "The door is always open to more conversation, but it's kind of beating a dead horse right now," said Miskimins. Coun. Dave Brunelle, however, was interested in the reason why progress had halted with no resolution, and pressed Evans for an explanation. Brunelle quoted from the letter penned by Penetanguishene, which read: "... we believe a collaborative approach is essential, as a group we can work better together for the improvement of all North Simcoe residents". Evans noted Tay's forfeit of attendance but focused on the two towns. "This discussion," said Evans, "was centred around continuing the previous policy that was in place in Tiny, when we're in - again, from a Tiny perspective - we provided services... and substantial funds to both facilities. And we've made a decision to go a different way now."Midland and Penetang, if I can paraphrase, are looking for a continuation of a previous policy. I did make a very clear statement on Monday that that is not something that the township of Tiny is interested in going back to. We've made a new policy, and we're going to stick with that for now," Evans stated.

Brunelle followed up with a question on what Tiny council would want looking ahead to future collaborations and discussion. "Because we can't just keep going back and forth and not moving forward; we need to move forward on this issue so that we get some resolution here," Brunelle stated. The question allowed Evans to expand further on the stalemate, pointing out that with differences in positions, it would be unknown if an alignment could be reached. "Just since July, this has changed," Evans said. "I wouldn't be surprised if it changes again moving forward." Evans also cited library agreements with Midland and Springwater Township, as well as the septage agreement with Midland, as instances where views aligned. "I do not agree that we are somehow responsible, or it's incumbent upon us to come up with a solution to make the town of Midland or Penetanguishene happy," Evans noted, adding that mutual benefit was the key. "Right now we don't need an agreement. Everything seems to be running somewhat fine."

Ending the discussion by mentioning that concerns would be addressed on a quarterly basis with a reminder that council members could contact other councils frequently, the recommendation to receive the July letter as information was approved with the only direction given to let the other municipalities know of the decision.

Of interest, a recent Tay Township report explored various funding formulas for Tay within North Simcoe, including instances where Tiny Township and other municipality fees could be discerned through numerous variables. The North Simcoe letter for user-fees and charges for all recreation amenities and services can be viewed on the agenda page on the Township of Tiny website.

GBGH progress constructing MRI building addition

September 11, 2024 - Georgian Bay General Hospital (GBGH) is making dramatic progress constructing an addition to its existing building which will house the future magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) equipment. The expansion of imaging services to include MRI marks a significant milestone in growing healthcare services for the communities GBGH serves. "Anyone who has visited GBGH in the past two months will notice a drastic and exciting change to the front façade of the building," says Matthew Lawson, president and CEO, GBGH. "Since breaking ground in late June, we have made significant progress in our MRI project. We anticipate being just a couple months away from having the equipment arrive and then, just a few more months after that, we will be able to scan our first patient at GBGH in early 2025."

MRI services at GBGH will enhance the overall patient experience, improve health outcomes, and reduce wait times as local patients will not be on the waitlists at other facilities in Barrie and Orillia. The hospital has been funded to operate the MRI for 2,000 hours annually, meaning approximately 2,000 patients will have an opportunity to receive this diagnostic procedure locally.

Some of the construction milestones reached to date include setting up the site, excavation, fortifying the foundation and footings, connecting plumbing, and pouring concrete for the columns and the slab. Next steps in construction include exterior framing (walls/windows), roof supports and drainage system installation, exterior doors and windows, interior framing and drywall, and mechanical/electrical roughins.

With a total investment of over \$8 million, this groundbreaking project underscores GBGH's commitment to providing more services closer to home. The GBGH Foundation has been fundraising for the MRI over the past 21 months with the goal of raising \$4 million toward the project. The fundraising tally currently sits at \$2.92 million.

"This incredible progress at GBGH is a testament to the hundreds of donors who have invested to make this project a reality," says Nicole Kraftscik, CEO, GBGH Foundation. "And, we continue to work with our community to fundraise the remaining \$1 million so that thousands of patients can receive this vital diagnostic service close to home."

Take the pledge and on Saturday, gather your family around, test your smoke alarm and ensure everyone knows what to do when it sounds.

On Saturday September 14 a new star was seen in the sky early in the morning over our community watching over us. That star came as a result of the passing of a community member who was well known, often seen on the rail trail and a valuable community volunteer. Lorie Adams who walked the trail daily with first George then Russel fought a courageous battle against cancer for many years. Unfortunately it was a battle that despite her determination and will won out. She will be greatly missed by everyone that knew her. To Doug, her husband, sons Luke and Joel and daughter Rachel, the community offers our most sincere condolences, Lorie will not be forgotten.

My daughter and I headed out to Port Carling for a short trek along the Hazelwood trail. This is a surprising trail hidden right near the downtown. I imagine the locals like to keep it a secret, as it is wonderful spot for a short hike. Follow the main road through Port Carling to the Hazelwood Road and stay to the right of the no exit sign to a small parking. As we started down the trail, I was amused by the glitter of small pieces of glass scattered throughout the bush, until there seemed to be crystalline shards everywhere. This oddity is soon explained by the large sign indicating that this was an old dump site, along with a warning about staying on the trail. Absolutely, because no one wants to get an updated tetanus shot from having walked through a pile of rusty cans! On the other hand, this is also an historic pioneer trail that connected Port Carling and Port Sandfield to the west. Pioneer wagons and garbage trucks all on the same trail, though not at the same time of course!

The trail is easy to navigate and there is no worries about losing the route and while it has several elevation changes they should not be too difficult for most people. The landscape is one of mature hardwoods, green undergrowth and acorns everywhere. That green landscape was being helped along by the pitter patter of rain through the canopy. I like hiking in the rain, the soft patter of tiny drops hitting each leaf, the stillness of the forest and that moist earth smell. That is at least how this hike started, just a gentle rain as we explored the winding trail. This linear trail is only 2.5 km, or 5 km in and out, which gives lots of time for meandering and exploring, as there is always new fungi to find. Near the final km, the trail becomes smaller and twister, with many exposed roots waiting to trip you up. If you take a moment to stop checking your feet, you can look up at the beautiful limestone bluff to your left. While a small bluff compared to those on the Escarpment, it is still a beautiful are of large grey rocks and leafy green ferns. This is also where I heard a roaring sound coming towards us from behind. Oh boy.

The leaves high up on the oaks and maples began to dance furiously, as the tiny and gentle rain drops morphed into massive spheres the size of teacups! Despite our rain jackets and hoods, we were both soaked within seconds. Talking was impossible, as the sound from those trillions of raindrops was deafening, and visibility was drastically diminished. This is also where the highlight of the trail was, a marshland and then a large beaver pond usual resplendent with birds and other wildlife. Instead of admiring the scenery, we slogged on through elephant sized puddles. I image on a nice day this is a lovely place to spend some time, but right now I was worried about disappearing into the thickening mud. This is also where the trail ends, at a local road that you can use to loop back to the parking lot. Instead, I turned my daughter around, and when she realized we had to go back the way we had come, through that rain, well, you can imagine the withering look that twenty-year-old managed to convey. Ok, so

rain is not everyone's cup of tea.

We did make it back to the car, just in time for the rain to stop. As we wrung the water out of clothing and attempted to dry our hair, I mused that this is a perfect hike, because I had an adventure with my daughter. There is nothing better than that.

A note here, while writing this article tonight, I noticed an update that the Hazelwood trail is closed starting Sept 23-Oct 4 for remediation work at the landfill. This will make the trail safer for everyone.

There are hundreds of varieties of cucumbers grown throughout the world and they belong to the same family of plant species as melons and squash. Cucumbers are 95% water, low in calories and a good source of phytonutrients, a powerful plant-based

antioxidant that has health protective benefits. Cucumbers are packed with many minerals and vitamins, including magnesium, potassium, manganese, vitamin K, vitamin C and the B vitamins.

INGREDIENTS

- 4 cups (1000 ml) field or English cucumbers, thinly sliced
- ¹/₄ cup (63 ml) salt to 'wilt' the cucumbers
- 2/3 cup (188 ml) red or white onions, thinly sliced

• 1/3 cup (83 ml) plain Greek yogurt, sour 7. Refrigerate until ready to serve. cream, or plant-based yogurt or sour cream

- 1 tablespoon (15 ml) rice vinegar, apple cider ENJOY!
- vinegar, or red wine vinegar

• 1 teaspoon (5 ml) honey, maple syrup or granulated sugar

- 2-3 tablespoons (30-45 ml) chopped fresh
- dill or 2-3 teaspoons dried dill
- Salt and pepper to taste

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Combine the salt and cucumbers in a bowl and set aside for 2-3 hours to 'wilt'.

2. Place the wilted cucumbers in a colander and thoroughly rinse for several minutes with cold water to remove the salt. Drain well.

3. In a medium bowl prepare the dressing by whisking together the vogurt or sour cream, vinegar, honey, maple syrup or sugar.

4. Add the cucumber, onion and dill to the bowl with the prepared salad dressing.

5. Taste and correct the seasoning with salt and pepper.

6. Garnish with fresh dill, if desired.

Agency looks to Springwater for more support as Tay backs out

Sep 21, 2024 - On Valentine's Day, Tay Township sent a letter to the Severn Sound Environmental Association (SSEA) advising them that the municipality was going to stop providing the organization with financial and human resources (HR) support.

This Wednesday, the SSEA was in front of Springwater Township council, hoping it might take on the responsibilities.Coun. Brad Thompson, who voted against providing the support the SSEA was looking for, asked executive director Julie Cayley if she could explain why Tay, and Midland before that, ended their support of these services. "I cannot," she said. "I'm not sure I could answer that — they (the town of Midland) might be able to answer it better. Tay, I don't have it in front of me, but the same. "Cayley said Tay would know why they made the decision. "Tay Township, over the past few years, has been critical of the SSEA's fiscal management, as over the last six years our annual SSEA levy has more than doubled with no increase to the services the SSEA provides," Tay Mayor Ted Walker said in an email to BarrieToday. "We voiced our concern to SSEA on several occasions."

Earlier this year, Walker said, the chair of the SSEA introduced a motion, in the spirit of transparency, to offer the financial and HR services to all member municipalities. The SSEA board passed the resolution. "Upon hearing this, we advised the SSEA, to support their goal of 'transparency' in this regard, Tay Township would cease the financial and HR services provided as of the end of June," Walker said. "We had been providing these services for several years following the Town of Midland ceasing same." According to Walker, Tay Township provided the services with existing staff "we did not have to hire anyone" — for the contract price, plus an annual cost-of-living increase pursuant to the agreement. "The SSEA a few months ago asked us for an extension to our withdrawal of services to the end of this year, as they had not made any progress in finding a member municipality to perform the services," Walker said. "We granted the extension."

In an effort to replace Tay, the SSEA contacted the other seven other members of the association — the towns of Midland and Penetanguishene and the townships of Georgian Bay, Oro-Medonte, Severn, Springwater, Tay and Tiny. "Tay sent the notification in February and I received it in March and shared the notice with the board at that time," Cayley said in an email to BarrieToday on Friday. "In early April, the SSEA sent a notice to the other seven joint municipal service board partners asking them for an expression of interest in providing financial and payroll services, so we approached all in April," she added. Cayley said more detailed discussions with partners who wanted more information to determine if they had the capacity to potentially provide these services began in mid-June.

On Wednesday night, Springwater council debated the pros and cons of supporting the SSEA's need for professional services before finally voting, in a 4-3 decision, to receive the report and direct staff to negotiate a memorandum of understanding with the SSEA for the provision of professional services and report back to council. The motion was amended to include council's direction to staff to recruit a permanent part-time position to assist the SSEA.

It should be noted that the Township of Georgian Bay, at its Sept. 9 council meeting, voted 5-2 in favour of leaving the SSEA. The township provided the SSEA with notification that it was leaving the association with a termination date of Dec. 31, 2025. "This is very new information to SSEA and we and the board are receiving it and will be working through what it means for the joint municipal service board moving forward," said Cayley. "While it is unfortunate that the Township of Georgian Bay has decided to enact their exit clause with the SSEA, it doesn't not change the organizations need for professional services or Springwater's need for the important work they provide," said Springwater Coun. Danielle Alexander, who is also SSEA vice-chair.

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




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Springwater council on the lookout for cheaper integrity commissioner

September 19, 2024 - Springwater Township Coun. Danielle Alexander tried to make her position crystal clear: she wasn't objecting to the findings of a recent integrity commissioner's report, she just objected to the cost.

At last night's council meeting, Alexander presented a notice of motion that directed the township clerk to seek invitational proposals for the services of an integrity commissioner and that those proposals be presented at the Oct. 16 council meeting for consideration.

"I want to make very clear my intent with this motion," Alexander said. "I did feel that for the \$27,000 that the township paid for the last report that was presented to us by Mr. Swayze, for two and a half pages of content, and when he came to the meeting he was unable to answer many of the direct questions to him, I feel it's just completely ridiculous. "The motion is just regarding what we paid for" she

"The motion is just regarding what we paid for," she added.

Alexander said she didn't believe the township received value for the work performed and again told council that a child could have authored it. "It was, I believe I said it before, I felt it was something my daughter could have written," Alexander said.

At the June 19 meeting of council, Robert Swayze, the township's integrity commissioner, delivered his report on three complaints his office had received two against Coun. Phil Fisher, brought by fellow Coun. Brad Thompson and Springwater Public Library board chair Adrian Graham, and one against Mayor Jennifer Coughlin, which was initiated by Fisher.

The report was especially critical of Fisher, who Swayze said engaged in "petty politics."

A majority of council voted to receive the integrity commissioner's report for information only. Alexander, Fisher and Deputy Mayor George Cabral voted against receiving it.

At that meeting, Fisher told Swayze, who billed the township a little more than 109 hours of work, or approximately \$30,000, he had done "a huge and costly disservice" to council. He reiterated that sentiment Wednesday night.

"Regardless of what the report was about or what the content was, the taxpayer was taken for a ride," said Fisher, while supporting Alexander's motion.

Thompson agreed, but for different reasons. "The real cost to the township is allowing the behaviour that was identified in the report to continue," the councillor said. "This motion and vote gives us an opportunity to send a clear message to right a wrong. "I won't be supporting this motion," Thompson added.

Coughlin said she was concerned with how township residents would react if they thought the municipality was looking to replace Swayze. "I do have concerns about the optics of this," Coughlin said. "The changeover from our previous (integrity commissioner) to Mr. Swayze was after a report was received by council that council didn't agree with or didn't like the findings. "A year ago, we, as a council, voted to extend (Swayze's) contract," the mayor added. "If we're suggesting it's not based on one finding, not a lot has happened since that time." Swayze was originally hired in 2020 after the council of the day decided to release its integrity commissioner at the time, Principles Integrity. Swayze was one of two providers who responded to the township's request for proposal (RFP) at the time.

Coughlin was against Alexander's motion initially. "If it was to terminate Mr. Swayze, I would have a much harder issue with it," she said. "We went with Mr. Swayze because he was the least expensive at the time. This is literally just looking to see if there's someone cheaper out there."

According to township documents, Swayze's contract with Springwater includes:

- Hourly rate of \$280 per hour
- Annual retainer of \$1,000
- Travel rate of \$140 per hour, when necessary
- 30-day termination clause for either party

On Wednesday night, township clerk Rene Ainsworth told council that she has ample time to secure invitational proposals — informal quotes from interested parties — and will have them ready for council's review Oct. 16.

Hospital Partnership Reaches Innovative Milestone in the Management of Electronic Health Records

EMRAM is an eight-stage (0-7) model that measures the use and utilization of EMR capabilities within hospitals. Institutions that reach Stage 6 have robust capabilities for clinical decision support, a highly secure health information exchange, and a sophisticated level of EMR integration that enables improved safety, quality, and efficiency in healthcare deliverv. For patients, Stage 6 certification means a better hospital experience. Streamlined access and use of data creates more personalized care delivery, and personal medical information is more accessible to them and their care providers, while the data itself is more secure than ever. Attaining EMRAM 6 is a monumental achievement for any hospital - less than dozen hospitals in Canada have earned it – but for the four local partner hospitals, it's especially remarkable given the complex logistical coordination involved. "Prior to our partnership, each hospital had its own unique processes, technologies and environment," says Dave Brewin, RVH Vice President, Digital Health and Regional Chief Information Officer. "Creating a unified approach to EMR adoption required not only technical integration, but also a cultural shift towards clinical standards and processes." To meet the rigorous standards set by HIMSS, digital health strategies and operational goals had to be aligned and clinical workflows, data

entry processes, and decision-making protocols standardized to ensure consistency and reliability across all sites.

Just as important as the technical prowess and logistical coordination required was the four partners' commitment to doing the right thing for the communities they serve. The pursuit of certification was not an external mandate or provincial requirement. The four sites voluntarily chose to seek it to ensure that each person who walks through their doors receives care informed by the best possible use of technology.

Working together to earn EMRAM 6 certification displays the four sites' commitment to leveraging technology to enhance patient care and drive innovation. It's a reflection of a collective dedication to continuous improvement in healthcare delivery so that patients can be assured their health information is accessible, accurate, safer, and used to inform the best possible care decisions.

Firearms Stolen From Tiny Township Home

(TINY TOWNSHIP, ON) An investigation is underway following a break and enter to a home in Tiny Township that resulted in the theft of several firearms and other items.

On the afternoon of September 15, 2024, members of the Southern Georgian Bay detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police attended a residence in the area of Overhead Bridge Road and Concession 12 of Tiny Township to investigate a break and enter that occurred in the days prior.

It was discovered that many items of value were taken from the home including a gun safe containing three handguns. The stolen firearms are described as a Browning .22 calibre handgun, a CZ9 9mm handgun and a Smith and Wesson 939 revolver. The make of the gun safe is Huntshield.

Detachment members are being assisted in the investigation by the Southern Georgian Bay Community Street Crime Unit (CSCU) and the OPP Central Region Forensic Identification Service (FIS).

OPP Charge Drivers Involved in Morning Crashes

(MIDLAND,ON) - Officers from the Southern Georgian Bay Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) were dispatched by the OPP Communication Centre to two separate vehicle crashes in the morning hours of September 19, 2024 leading to charges for involved drivers.

The Communication Centre received at approximately 6:29 a.m. an automated crash notification from a Ford motor vehicle in the south bound lanes of Highway 400 near Joe King's Road, Georgian Bay Township.

Responding emergency services (EMS) included Georgian Bay Fire Services, County of Simcoe Paramedic Services, MTO Roadway Service Contractor along with uniform OPP officers who attended the scene and located the lone involved Ford Edge.



The lone occupant was triaged at the scene by EMS and transported to an area hospital for nonlife threatening injuries. Investigation into the cause of the crash resulted in the 36 year old male driver of Elliot Lake being charged with Careless Driving contrary to the Highway Traffic Act.

An earlier crash at 5:36 a.m. resulted in officers being dispatched to a report of a parked vehicle being struck by another vehicle that was travelling on William Street, Victoria Harbour. Upon the officers speaking with the involved driver, an impaired driving investigation was commenced.

The investigating officer called upon an OPP Drug Recognition Expert (DRE) to assist and as a result Shawn Kristen FISHER 55 years of Midland has been charged criminally with the following driving offence.
Operation while impaired - alcohol and drugs The accused was released from custody to appear before the Ontario Court of Justice on October 3, 2024 and was served a 90 day driver's licence suspension in accordance to the Ministry of Transportation (ADLS) guidelines.

DOOR-TO-DOOR SALES/LIENS/ MORTGAGE FRAUD INVESTIGATION Two arrested and 3 Arrest Warrants Issued

(TORONTO, ON) - Members of Ontario's Serious Fraud Office (SFO) have arrested two individuals and Canada-wide arrest warrants have been issued for three others following a criminal investigation linked to a door-to-door sales fraud which victimized over 200 people across Ontario.

In summer 2021, Collingwood OPP began an investigation, which was later referred to the OPP Serious Fraud Office in February 2022 at which time Project Nettle commenced.

During this investigation, it was discovered salespeople were directed to attend the homes of older adults and vulnerable people to initiate frauds where victims unknowingly entered into home service and/or renovation agreements at exorbitant prices. Many victims believed they were getting services/installations and renovations for free through government grants or rebates.

Organizers of this fraud then used the fake agreements to register Notice of Security Interest's (NOSIs) which are similar to liens against victims' homes without their knowledge. Later, these NOSIs were paid off to the benefit of the fraud organizers using fraudulent, high-interest mortgages against the victims' homes. In many cases, this fraud left the victims in financial peril; and in some cases, forced the victims to sell their homes.

The SFO conducted more than 230 interviews during the investigation. It is evident this fraud has been financially, emotionally, and physically devastating for many victims across the province. Victims of this fraud were provided support from investigators and SFO victim support services throughout the investigation.

The SFO would like to acknowledge the important contributions by members of Collingwood OPP, Barrie Police, Durham Regional Police Service, Guelph Police, Hamilton Police Service, Ottawa Police Service, Peel Regional Police, Toronto Police Service, York Regional Police, Waterloo Regional Police Service, as well as The Financial Transactions and Reports Analysis Centre of Canada (FINTRAC).

You can check for any NOSIs against your home by purchasing a copy of your parcel register through the Ontario Land Registry Access at www.onland. ca. If you find a NOSI against your home, the newly enacted Homeowner Protection Act deems all consumer NOSIs registered before June 6, 2024, to be expired and allows them to be removed by registering an application to delete an expired NOSI through a lawyer. The Consumer Protection Act also allows you to withdraw from a contract within one year and get a full refund if a business or individual has misrepresented a product or service. Products or services sold door-to-door also have a 'cooling off period' that allows you to cancel an agreement within 10 days.

On September 16, 2024, at approximately 5:45 a.m., the Huronia West OPP, Fire, and EMS responded to a collision after a passenger vehicle traveling southbound on Baseline Road stuck a tree. The driver, who was the sole occupant of the vehicle, was first transported to a local hospital before airlifted to a Toronto-area trauma centre by Air Ornge with life-threatening injuries.

Southbound Baseline Road between Flos Road 7 East and Flos Road 8 East is current closed while officers of the OPP Huronia West Detachment and Traffic Incident Management Enforcement (TIME) Team process the scene.

The investigation is ongoing and updates will be provided when available.

THREAT TO LOCAL SCHOOL RESULTS IN MULTIPLE WEAPONS CHARGES

(CLEARVIEW TOWNSHIP) - The Collingwood and Blue Mountains Detachment and the Huronia West Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) have seized numerous weapons and laid charges following an investigation into a threat made to a local school.

On September 11, 2024, the Collingwood and Blue Mountains OPP received a report regarding a potential threat to Collingwood Collegiate Institute in Collingwood by a former student. The report indicated that the threat was not imminent as it had been made in March 2024.

Regardless, the OPP takes all threats to public safety seriously and provides resources necessary to assess and respond to the threat. Public safety is our top priority.

During the investigation, police discovered that the former student may possess weapons in his vehicle and residence in Clearview Township. When police attended the residence, officers located 2 firearms and several high-capacity magazines, all improperly stored and without a valid firearms licence.

Police located and stopped the individual's vehicle in a parking lot on Cameron Street in Collingwood, where the driver and a passenger were arrested without incident. During the arrest, police also seized 2 replica firearms, bear spray, pepper spray, a knife, and brass knuckles.

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Orr Lake neighbours present both sides of short-term rental debate

Sep 13, 2024 -Two Orr Lake neighbours share the same situation yet have completely different takes on that experience.

One owns a cottage at 3 Cedar Lane and rents it out as a short-term rental (STR), which she says contributes to the local economy. It provides local jobs, customers to local businesses, lots of cleaners to maintain the property and trades," Ann Fan told Springwater Township council on Wednesday night. She was speaking virtually during a mandatory public meeting for the consideration of an Official Plan amendment and zoning bylaw amendment for STRs in the township.

Meanwhile, Fan's neighbour at 7 Cedar Lane has a differing perspective. "People tend to arrive, back their car up, open the back up, taking their coolers, their beer cases, their pop cases and a lot of them don't leave for the weekend," said Nora Dixon, a senior and Fan's Orr Lake neighbour, who appeared in person at council.

"I think that's in part, because they (Fan) provide so many recreational activities for them they don't need to leave. They can stay there and have a whale of a time," Dixon added. "Do they really contribute to the local economy?" While Dixon says she has excellent relations with her neighbour — "we really have no complaints about them or the unit as a whole" - she thought it was important that council see both sides of the issue. Orr Lake is located just a few minutes outside of Elmvale. Dixon's was the only voice to oppose STRs at this week's meeting.

Currently, according to Deborah-Ann Liske, a planner with the township, land-use planning documents do not define short-term rentals and do not list it as a permitted use within residential zones. As the township considers regulating them, it needed to update the township land use planning documents. "Following the direction from the township's solicitor in spring of this year, and direction received from council in July, staff have drafted the necessary amendments to the township's Official Plan and zoning bylaw, which is the subject of tonight's public meeting," Liske said. Liske noted these are draft documents, which were the topic of discussion at Wednesday's public meeting, and no staff recommendation has been provided at this time. The township initiated an amendment to the Official Plan to provide guiding policies for the consideration of short-term rentals that would be implemented through the township's zoning bylaw and also administered through an STR licensing program. "The draft zoning bylaw amendment proposes to provide a definition of a short-term rental accommodation and permit such accommodations as a secondary use within all zones that

permit a residential dwelling unit, a seasonal dwelling unit and an additional residential unit," Liske said. That definition would include that a short-term rental accommodation must be secondary to the established main residential use. "This inclusion in the definition ensures that short-term rentals are not primary use, as such use would be more in line with a definition of a commercial accommodation," Liske said. "This means that a dwelling unit cannot be rented out on a shortterm basis more than it is used as a primary dwelling, therefore the long-term residential component of the property is still maintained."

The terminology 'secondary' was added into the definition based on the township solicitor's advice that the municipality provide a clear distinction in the proposed definition of when the use becomes a commercial accommodation. The draft bylaw amendment proposes a minimum parking requirement — one space per bedroom that is rented — and limits short-term accommodations to no more than 28 consecutive calendar days. The bylaw amendment, as drafted, would permit STR accommodations in all residential zones within Springwater.

The township's planning staff will now review all comments, provide possible revisions to the drafted policies, and provide a recommendation to council at a later date.

Sep 19, 2024 - As captains for their municipality, Penetanguishene council ran a clean ship over the past year. The message from the integrity commissioner's periodic report was further discussed as the town's appointed representative Principles Integrity gave a presentation during the recent regular council meeting.

Jeffrey Abrams of Principles Integrity explained that the report was meant to provide council and the public "on the ethical wherewithal of the town's elected officials and its appointed officials," between the period of June 2023 to the end of May 2024. "I'm happy to report that in the period in question, there wasn't a lot of activity; we didn't have any education training or policy development work," said Abrams. "We responded to one request for advice. "There were three complaints that were filed with us; all of them were disposed of without the need for a full investigation and a recommendation report, so there were no findings against a member that would've triggered a report to council. "In each of the cases, we write a disposition letter. As is our obligation, we explained our decision to both the complainant and a respondent member involved," Abrams explained. Abrams also provided a broader perspective toward the provincial lens, touching on the subjects of breaches of confidentiality (giving a stern recommendation for monetary sanction) as well as conflicts of interest. However, Abrams spent the latter half of the presentation addressing "the issue of occurrences of disparagement, disrespect and even harassment and bullying in councils." Within the report, Principles Integrity had detailed elements of harassment seen provincially which included council members who interrogate staff or seek different answers than can be provided by staff by 'asking the hard questions'. Since completing the report, Abrams drew attention to an August announcement by Municipal Affairs and Housing

Minister Paul Calandra at the Association of Municipalities of Ontario conference that "made some indication that there was going to be a uniform code of conduct for all municipalities, that's been referred to the provincial integrity commissioner for some work and recommendations. "We're not quite sure what the intention is," said Abrams. He expressed concerns regarding legislative change without pragmatic guidance which could interfere with the ability for an integrity commissioner to give course correction "in a timely, fair, and affordable way".

Two reasons were listed in the report: Every harassment complaint could force extensive reviews at a much greater cost than to resolve the matter through an integrity commissioner; and the timespan for imposing remedies could be measured in years in contrast to the few months that an integrity commissioner provides advice. "One example that I think is quite obvious to us is under the Education Act: a school board, upon the investigation and report of an integrity commissioner, can suspend a member's - not only their compensation for a period of time, but their attendance for a period of time. That, in and of itself, can remedy a number of situations," Abrams said. The presentation was described by Abrams as "our own good news story on council's ethical compliance" following the previous deputation where the annual Penetanguishene financial audit was similarly praised by Mayor Doug Rawson. The integrity commissioner's periodic report from June 2023 to May 2024 can be located on the agenda page of the Town of Penetanguishene website. Meetings of Penetanguishene council are held on the second Wednesday of each month, and can be watched live on Rogers TV cable 53 when available, or on the Rogers TV website. Archives of council meetings are located on the Town of Penetanguishene YouTube channel.



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


