

Take notice that the Council of The Corporation of the Township of Springwater will hold a hybrid public meeting (in person and/ or virtually via Zoom) on **Wednesday, September 11, 2024 at 6:30 p.m.** to consider the proposed applications under Sections 17, 21, and 34 of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, c. P 13 as amended.

Subject Lands

Entire geographic area of the Township of Springwater. **No key map** has been included in this notice as the proposed amendment applies to the entire municipality.

Purpose and Effect

The purpose of the proposed amendments is to update the Township of Springwater's Official Plan and Zoning By-law to permit and regulate Short-Term Rental Accommodations throughout the municipality. The effect of the proposed Official Plan Amendment and Zoning By-law Amendment will provide a definition of a 'Short-Term Rental Accommodation' and permit such accommodations as a secondary use within all zones that permit a residential dwelling unit, a seasonal dwelling unit or an additional residential unit (ARU). The By-law Amendment will further provide minimum parking requirements and limit Short-Term Rental Accommodations to no more than 28 consecutive calendar days.Further provisions, restrictions and limitations will be established through a Short-Term Rental Accommodation licensing process under the Municipal Act.

To Participate and/or Make Comment

Interested stakeholders/residents that would like to comment/participate in the hybrid Council meeting in person are asked to please pre-register with the Township prior to Tuesday, September 10, 2024, at 5:30 PM.

Written and oral submissions will form part of the public meeting record, including the name and address of the commenters, as information collected under the Planning Act.

The minutes, written submissions and a recording of the meeting will be posted on the Township's website. Any person may make a submission in support of, in opposition to, or ask a question regarding the proposed amendments. Written submissions are recommended and can be made to the Planning Department by email, regular post or the drop box located at the Administration Building. Please ensure all written submissions include your name, address, and the application number.

If a person or public body would otherwise have an ability to appeal the decision of the Council of the Township of Springwater to the Ontario Land Tribunal but the person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Township of Springwater before the by-law is passed, the person or public body is not entitled to appeal the decision.

If a person or public body does not make oral submissions at a public meeting or make written submissions to the Township of Springwater before the by-law is passed, the person or public body may not be added as a party to the hearing of an appeal before the Ontario Land Tribunal unless, in the opinion of the Tribunal, there are reasonable grounds to do so.

If you wish to be notified of the Council's decision to approve the proposed Official Plan Amendment and Zoning By-law Amendment, or of the refusal of a request to amend the Zoning By-law, a written request must be submitted to the Planning Department.

Additional information related to the proposed Zoning By-law Amendment will be available on the Township of Springwater's website as part of the Agenda which is posted five days prior to the public meeting date. Hey Dads!

Does anyone at your house plant a vegetable garden? Nine of our 10 kids are pretty helpful in the garden. We have a 4-month old baby, Juniper, and she hasn't helped in the garden too much, but I'll let it go. The teenagers are really helpful in the garden, the middle class is somewhat helpful in the garden and the younger siblings are...well, they're definitely in the garden too.

Our 3-year-old daughter, Mabel, needs frequent reminders to walk up and down between the rows of plants. She likes to hop through the garden over plants, through plants and on plants, crushing the tender growth beneath her stomping feet. Usually, her bare feet because for some reason Mabel is allergic to shoes. Whenever our family heads out the door someone is calling out, "Does Mabel have shoes on?". No problem in August but slightly inconvenient in February. Sometimes she just wears socks outside without shoes and eventually abandons the socks somewhere around the yard where I can run over them with the mower.

In the last few weeks we've been harvesting beans, peas, and beets. There is typically great enthusiasm when I ask some of the smaller kids to come help pick beans in the garden. The picking begins. Children are excited. Beans are placed in buckets. Many beans are consumed by children. I'm okay with that. After all, isn't that why we grow them?

I have my head down furiously picking away like a madman and after a few minutes I look up...to find myself alone. I hear voices of kids around the yard riding bikes or removing socks or swinging sticks at each other which are all good activities for kids to do. But not the activities we set out to accomplish.

Sometimes I'll try to wrangle them back to the garden and sometimes I'll let them frolic in the yard. The older kids are pretty good at sticking to the picking until we've got a great big bowlful of beans. My teen daughters even broke out the Mason jars last week and canned bunches of beans and beets. Did you ever look at the price of a teeny, tiny bag of fresh beans at No Frills? Where I live it's \$6.00 for a 400gram bag! (That's a small bag, by the way) At that price point I estimate we've picked over \$600 worth of beans from our garden this year. The cheap dutch part of me gets really excited about that number.

So, hopefully our garden is saving us some money even if 10% of the product is getting stomped out by 3-year-old Mabel. The memories we're making in the garden are priceless (as long as I can keep my cool when my precious beans are being destroyed). The kids love eating the fresh vegetables from the garden and I love watching them. If they're working and picking that's a bonus! Time flies, dad! Make every moment count! Even the bare-footed beanstomping ones!

August 7, 2024, Submitted by Town of Midland At a Special Meeting of Council held August 7, 2024, Council appointed Mr. Eric (Howie) Major as a member of Council. The appointment is effective immediately as Councillor Major took the declaration of office at the meeting. He will act in his official capacity as Councillor for the balance of the current Council term until November 2026.

Councillor Major has been a long-time champion of Midland and has demonstrated his devotion to the Town through the many Town committees he has served on. 
The Creative Team is led by Director and Choreographer David Connolly, who helmed last year's production of Peter Pan: The Panto.

Signs and symptoms of anaphylaxis include: swelling of lips, tongue or throat, shortness of breath, trouble breathing, dizziness, fainting, stomach pain, nausea, vomiting, rapid or weak pulse, hives and itching. **REMEMBER:**

\$200,000 OTF Grant Builds Program Resiliency for Adults with Developmental Disabilities

August 12, 2024 - Submitted by Office of Doug Downey, MPP Barrie, ON – On Friday August 9, local MPP Doug Downey met with the team at Camphill Communities Ontario to hear more about the \$200,000 Resiliency Grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF) that was used to adapt, rebuild and expand Camphill's day services, including robust pottery, cafe, community and volunteer programs. Through this project, Camphill has been able to build capacity, resilience and sustainability for their in-demand day services, giving more adults with developmental disabilities improved access to recreational, community, vocational, and skill-building programs for years to come.

"Órganizations like Camphill Communities Ontario offer adults living with intellectual and developmental disabilities the support to live their lives with dignity and freedom," said Doug Downey, MPP for Barrie – Springwater – Oro-Medonte. "I am grateful that this funding from the Ontario Trillium Foundation has helped Camphill to increase their services in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic. This funding will help to address critical gaps and eliminate future uncertainty so Camphill can continue to serve its clients with the high quality care they have come to expect."

Following the rolling lockdowns due to COVID, several organizations that used to offer day programs for adults with disabilities never reopened, leading to increased demand and a shortage of services over the past several years. A NOTE FROM DOUG

August 6, 2024 - Recently, we've seen an unprecedented rise in violent crime across Canada. New Statistics Canada data shows that since the Liberal government came into power nine years ago, violent crime has increased by 50%.

In Ontario alone, violent crime is up 51.54%. Homicides are up 50.57%, while violent firearms offences are up 97.07%, Extortion is up 383.80%, and Auto thefts are up 167.07%.


Things have gotten so bad that last month, every single Canadian premier wrote a letter pleading with the Liberal government to scrap their catch-and-release bail policies before more lives are lost. In their letter, they state that "police services should not have to chase the same criminal three or four times because of an inadequate bail system. This not only represents a drain on policing resources but is a hindrance to public safety."

It's clear what is causing this surge in crime. Trudeau's Bill C-75 has all but guaranteed that even the worst violent offenders will be released on bail shortly after they're arrested while Bill C-5 has taken away mandatory jail time for even the most serious offences. As a direct result of this dangerous catch-andrelease agenda, data directly from the Liberal government shows that 256 homicides were committed by an offender who was out on release in 2022 alone.

The perpetrators committing these crimes make up a small portion of the population, but, because of the Liberal government's catch-and-release bail policies, these repeat offenders have been continually released back onto the street with no accountability.

Conservatives are the only party committed to fixing Canada's broken bail system, and putting an end to the wave of violent crime that is plaguing our country. Conservatives will continue to advocate for strict bail rules that will ensure violent offenders remain behind bars as they await trial, and if convicted are incarcerated for many years. Projecting Assumptions

There is a practice that has the power to sabotage communication and relationships. We all do it or have done it. However, to say that your teenager thinks everyone should pick up after him, because he never puts anything away, is an assumption, unless he actually made that statement.

Statements such as, "You think you can just walk all over me", "You think the world revolves around you", or "You just don't care", are actually very invasive, hostile and judgmental. It is hard for the recipient of such messages to respond in any reasonable way. Denial of the allegation generally invites further judgments, as the speaker tries to prove his or her assumption is accurate. Saying, for example, that he does care, may cause the speaker to cite a litany of examples "proving" that he does not. Unable to respond reasonably, the one attacked may resort to tossing out a few assumptions of his own, reacting angrily, or simply walking away. Of course, this "proves" to the initiator that she was right all along. Right? Wrong!

This is what we call crazy-making. It distorts the communication process and takes on a life of its own. We must let others speak for themselves. We honor them when we take the time to ask what their thoughts and feelings are. We must accept what they say as their truth. There is simply no point in arguing with someone about what they think, because we cannot get into their heads. If there is any doubt in your mind about how this affects others, just try to remember a time when someone either told you what you thought, or otherwise insisted he knew more about what is in your head than you did. 





I have made it abundantly clear that I detest heights. Not the "oh dear, that looks a little high and I will stand back a few feet from the edge" type

of fear, but the full on "I am going to die and topple headfirst over the abyss" type of fear. And yet, here I am, teetering on the edge of another precipice with a view way, way down to the land far, far below.

I love the Niagara Escarpment, with its rock formations, unique biospheres and yes, even its spectacular views. The Bruce Trail runs along this rugged landscape and offers an abundance of trails for both novice and experienced hikers. I was childishly amused by the description of a trail called "Old Baldy". Now, I struggle mightily to hold my tongue, but really, all of you ladies are already turning to your man and making a spot on comment about the how those flowing locks of his youth seemed to have migrated down the chest and back to make an absolutely lovely man vest, topped by a glistening dome. Enough said. This Old Baldy is a bare area of grey limestone that drops an impressive 152 meters or just under 500 feet to the beautiful Beaver Valley. It is not uncommon to find the more adventurous scaling the cliff face in climbing gear.

From Midland it took my daughter and I about an hour and a half to get to the Grey Highlands area near Kimberly. Our GPS was set to the shortest route, which I don't recommend, as we left the paved road, then the dirt road, past a sign indicating no winter maintenance, and then a sign saying we were on an OFSC snowmobile trail that was barely wide enough for our car, that thread through a deep and dark swamp. All part of the adventure! We did manage to make it to the car parking area without issue though we did take a less scenic road back out.

The trail is well maintained and heads out from the parking area through cedar forests with boardwalks to cross the wettest areas, and through small glades of purple milkweed. I suspect that there was a farmstead here long ago, as there are several apple trees still producing small tart fruit. The gradual uphill climb is easy for any hiking ability, until the trees thin and you are walking next to that spectacularly scary drop.

There are several areas where the trail has eroded away, and the earth slides away off and down to the ground far below. This is where I skirt off into the bush to avoid being any where near that drop and hope that I don't drop down into an unseen cavern eroded by water through the limestone. I am so thankful that my daughter understands my fears and is agreeable to remain well back from the edge, even when she would happily



hang over and dangle her legs from its edges. I did have a panic attack and needed to sit while I hyperventilated and experienced severe vertigo, envisioning that edge creeping closer and closer. Strange, as I used to rock climb, but I find that the older I get the more my fears increase. Perhaps as we age, we both value life more and understand the dangers that are inherent in so much of what we do. I did manage to take a selfie, though it is obvious that I am uncomfortable, and have a death grip on a tree that I am convinced will be uprooted by my pressure on it and send us both

The trail continues along the ridgeline until it veers off to the left on the blue blazed Mac Kirk side trail, or you could continue down the white blazed Bruce Trail. The blue loop trail is a short 4.5 km trail that will return you to the parking area. I was much more relaxed on this portion of trail that navigates through old forest filled with ferns and mushrooms. Altogether this is an easy hike suitable for any ability, though children and pets should always be in your control. A perfect way to tell your spouse that you climbed old

August 11, 2024 - Were you able to see any shooting stars this past week? Shooting stars are actually meteorites and from mid July to mid August, the Perseid meteor showers can light up the night sky with about 60 visible per hour. This past week was the peak and this year the lack of moon light along with limited clouds in the sky made for perfect viewing especially in the predawn hours. If you missed it this year, it is an annual event so look for them next year. It is not hard to notice that our daylight hours are starting to get shorter. From the Summer Solstice on June 20 which had 15 hours and 32 minutes of

Penetanguishene couple experience 'weird' double-billing

Aug 12, 2024 - As the cost of living continues to rise, one retired Penetanguishene couple have found themselves in the unfortunate circumstance of a \$640 property tax increase in the past three years without a definitive reason.

Wanda Jessome and her husband Don are seniors living on Bellisle Road near Poyntz Street, having moved to the property in 2021. She is on disability and he is on a retirement pension.

Final tax bills are mailed to Penetanguishene residents in the first week of July, and the Jessomes were surprised to see that their 2023 property tax had increased a second time since moving in, jumping from nearly \$3,400 to just over \$4,000

Wanda contacted MidlandToday to explore what could be the reasoning for the 18.9 per cent tax increase and the two MPAC assessments of 2021 and 2023.

After speaking to some neighbours who said they hadn't received the same increase, the Jessomes requested help from the town who they said advised them to contact MPAC (Municipal Property Corporation), the organization Assessment responsible for assessing all properties in Ontario.

In response, the Jessomes say MPAC advised them to contact the town.

"It's one of those tangles where you're just kind of being led from here to there and going back in a circle again, and not getting your answers," said Jessome. "And it's a little frustrating."

The town website hosts a page dedicated to property tax information, ranging from property assessment and tax sales, tax payments with explanations, and utility bills and payment information.

Penetanguishene director of finance/treasurer Carrie Robillard explained that the council-approved blended tax rate from 2023 to 2024 was an increase of 3.5 per cent – those blended taxes included the town, Simcoe County, and education for the province.

"Anything above and beyond that per cent would be related to an assessment increase," said Robillard, "and why the assessment increased is not known by town staff.

"Town hall always provides as much information that is known to us and explains how the property tax bill is calculated and why there would be a year-overyear increase," Robillard added. "Tax rate increases we can clearly explain - however, we don't know why in particular a property assessment increases; only MPAC can answer that for the resident."

MPAC mails property assessment notices annually in November as a way to support municipal and provincial calculations for property and education taxes, and Penetanguishene states they will provide contact information for MPAC and help submit requests for reconsideration to MPAC on behalf of residents. However, the Jessomes admitted they didn't pay attention to the dispute deadline in the November notification, and as a result had missed this year's file date listed between January to March to report discrepancies. "We kind of just looked at it and put it in our file thinking, 'this is the second one we received since we've moved here... weird," Jessome said. "The only thing MPAC will tell us is, if they come out and do another assessment it may not even be in our favour; it could be worse. I'm like: what? I told my husband, he said, 'Are you guys threatening us?' And they said they're not, and I believe they're not. "The two times we've had this MPAC notice of assessment done... I don't know how. They've never come on the property, they've never notified us, we haven't seen anybody. We have a dog; trust me, we'd know if somebody was on the property." By: Derek Howard, Local Journalism Initiative Fitzsimmins told Midland Today that properties were postponing 2020 assessments at 2016 market values. reviewed regularly for current state and condition to ensure accurate assessments, with property inspections as just one tool. However, before visiting a property, owners may receive either a two-month advance letter that MPAC would be in the area to inspect properties, or a letter requesting owners to call so property information could be updated or verified by phone.

> "MPAC property inspectors are not permitted to enter a residential property unless invited to do so by the property owner," Hinds Fitzsimmins affirmed.

> The Jessomes stated they had not made any renovations to their property since moving in, and that the street they live on is in somewhat of a state of disrepair.

> "When I go on to the MPAC website and I look at the reasoning for raising taxes," said Jessome, "we don't meet any of those reasons. Our road is falling apart where we sit; it gets flooded whenever it rains, like we get a huge puddle. The asphalt is constantly falling apart. We don't have a sidewalk on our side at all.

> "When I look out my living room window, I'm looking at an electricity fenced-in grid. That's my view. I have a school just beside that, so traffic is bizarre twice a day."

> Their suspicions skewed toward new properties being built further down along Bellisle Road toward the subdivisions of Thompsons Road West, as some MPAC neighbourhood inspection conditions listed included high sales in the area, or a high number of requests for reconsideration or appeals to their assessment review board.

> One suggestion made by town staff, according to the Jessomes, was possible short-staffing at MPAC and the impact which COVID-19 had on

Hinds Fitzsimmins noted that a provincial review of property assessment and taxation was announced last August, deferring reassessments through 2024 and possibly beyond until that review is completed.

Regarding the suggestion that MPAC was shortstaffed, Hinds Fitzsimmins responded: "The ongoing postponement of a reassessment does not change the work we do every day to maintain our extensive property database and deliver annual assessment rolls to municipalities."

She added that an inventory of all provincial properties and accounts for those changes continued to be maintained. "We continue to conduct market analysis through sales investigations, capture new assessment - new construction, additions and/or renovations to existing property that MPAC has not assessed - complete tax applications, and manage requests for reconsideration and appeals."

Hinds Fitzsimmins wished to remind property owners who spot a discrepancy to call MPAC's Customer Contact Centre at 1-866-296-6722 from Monday to Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Additionally, a new Property Pulse Dashboard was launched recently on the About MyProperty online tool, aiming to help homeowners "make informed decisions about their residential properties".

As for why the Jessomes contacted the media regarding their circumstances, Wanda replied: "I just thought, has this happened to anybody else? Maybe it's happening to other people and we just don't know it; but it's not happening fairly."

Tiny deflates referendum calls alongside Ombudsman commendation

Aug 08, 2024 - Attempts by the 'Stop the Build' group to find any foothold against the upcoming Tiny Township administration centre (TTAC) project continue to slip out of grasp, including contacting the provincial Ombudsman and denied calls for a referendum.

At the recent meetings of council, opposition supporters attended in low spirits following a threepage correspondence to the municipality from the Ontario Ombudsman which not only addressed complaints regarding meeting practices of the TTAC committee, but then commended "the Township for taking these steps to increase the transparency of the TTAC Committee's activities" without requiring a need to do so.

During the open deputations portion of the meeting, opposition and protest organizer Karen Zulynik took a proactive stance of defence ahead of its place in the agenda much later in the evening.

"You guys might think it's a (cause for) champion, but I want to say my two cents because it's a report in the agenda," said Zulynik, who disagreed with the Ombudsman's findings. "There's absolutely zero mention in the TTAC's minutes about any opposition to the construction. Zero. And I've read every single minutes."

Zulnyik added that the response was in "total disrespect" to herself and the group, who sent "an actual box of documents to them," adding that instead of being contacted by the Ombudsman, "I only learned of it in the minutes of your agenda today."

Before council would address the Ombudsman portion, the rest of the meeting needed to proceed.

Further open deputations included a grandparent who brought along her grandchild "to see the democratic process in action," and to display to council who would be inheriting the costs of the TTAC down the road.

During the matters for consideration portion of the committee of the whole where council would typically 'receive as information' or direct staff further into a course of action, the attendees increased in their excitement as previous deputant Borys Kowalsky's referendum request was addressed; Zulnyik announced "this is it" from her seat in the back of the chambers.

with talking points against the project for nearly five minutes resulting in resounding applause at its conclusion.

It was interrupted midway through, however, as Brunelle spoke regarding the ecological ambition of a net-zero energy and net-zero design for the facility. "Are we truly pursuing an environmentally responsible path, or is there another agenda cloaked in green rhetoric?"

Coun. Steffen Walma interjected with a point of privilege. "I'm going to ask the councillor to clarify what he means by 'cloaked', suggesting that there's an undertone of – what, sir?"

Prompted by Mayor Dave Evans, Brunelle replied: "Can I respond after I finish my thing?"

Once finished, Brunelle mused aloud."Cloaked', how can I define cloak? I think Dr. Kowalsky would be doing a much better job than myself, who has a Ph.D. On this definition of cloak, the way I see it, a cloak will darken or cover up – that's to me what cloak means... there seems to be something hidden about a green agenda."

Walma retorted: "The way that I interpret that, is that there's alleging that there's something dirty happening; there's a fix in of some kind.

"Council has never said that we are building a building to be more green; we are building a building to be more efficient, and we are going to be green." Walma cited the township's official plans and strategic plans to reiterate, noting that not incorporating green initiatives into the TTAC would be irresponsible planning.

"I take offence to the opinion that you just offered, in public, that there is some secret agenda," Walma stated.

Brunelle replied that "the values and philosophies of people are going to be on different pages, and another reason why we should have a referendum."

He then sprung an impromptu 200-word motion asking council to approve a pause on the build for those reasons and requested a referendum, which caused attendees to applaud loudly.

After council approved receiving Kowalsky's deputation for information, Brunelle's motion was introduced and required a seconder for further discussion or approval. However, none of the four other council members chose to second the motion, and it lay dead.

for the benefit of those with troubles accessing the electronic agenda items.

Coun. Kelly Helowka further asked staff if the municipal costs to involve the Ombudsman's Office could be provided for the public benefit, but was informed that those numbers weren't available.

Following the meeting, Evans spoke to MidlandToday regarding the referendum portion of the meeting, which had been discussed during a protest the week prior held outside the municipal office.

"I think there was a little bit of miscommunication or misunderstanding, unfortunately," said Evans. "As part of a deputation made by Boris Kowalsky, he did ask for a referendum. And I think there were some people in the crowd that assumed that when we discuss a deputation in the following meeting, that that was actually going to take place.

"I interpreted from my position that people were a little shocked that there was no referendum, and I honestly don't know how they came up with that impression that there was a referendum because there was nothing on the agenda; it was being received as information."

Regarding Brunelle's motion, Evans acknowledged that the four-against-one position was contrary to Brunelle but that council respected his position.

"In this case, I believe the subject for the last six or seven months now has been debated quite a bit," said Evans. "I can't speak for the other three members, but personally (my view was) I don't think we need to rehash this anymore."

Loud disapproval filled the chambers as council addressed the next agenda item on paid parking, and while Kowalsky attempted to be the voice of civility by gently asking the opposition to quiet down, nearly all left immediately following council's inaction on the referendum item.

Zulynik remained as did Kowalsky, and the issue of the Ombudsman report returned where Deputy Mayor Sean Miskimins read aloud the full letter




